The regular monthly meeting of the board of directors of the Prince Rupert General Hospital was held last night in the hospital. Those present were G. V. Wilkinson, president, R. E. Benson, G. P. Tinker, S. D. Macdonald and W. M. Brown, directors; H. W. Birch, managing secretary, and Miss Jean Harrison R.N., lady superintendent.

During the month of August, according to the report of the finance committee, S. D. Macdonald, chairman, presented at the monthly meeting of the board of directors of the Prince Rupert General Hospital last night, there were 1,345 hospital days at the Prince Rupert General Hospital at a cost per hospital diem of \$2.56. Expenditure of the hospital for the month totalled \$3439.13. No statement was made in regard to receipts for the month or surplus or deficit.

On recommendation of the finance committee, the hospital board, last night decided to purchase at a cost of \$90 an adding machine for the managing secretary's office.

Arthur Tey, lighthouse keeper at Guard Island near Ketchikan and Mrs. Tey were passengers on board the Princess Maquima yesterday afternoon bound for a vacation trip to Seattle.

Miss Helen Randal R.N., registrar of the Graduate Nurse's Association of British Columbia, arrived in the city on the Prince George this morning from Vancouver to pay her annual visit of inspection, as inspector of nurses' training schools for the province, to the Prince Rupert General Hospital. She will be here until Saturday night when she will return on the Prince Rupert to Vancouver.

During his visit to the city at the end of last week, Premier T.D. Pattullo called at the Prince Rupert General Hospital, it was reported at last night's meeting of the hospital board. The Premier was particularly anxious to again meet and reiterate his appreciation to the nurses who had ministered to him when he was a patient in the hospital for a couple of weeks at the first of the year.

Miss Jean Harrison R.N., lady superintendent, reported at the regular monthly meeting last night of the board of directors of the Prince Rupert General Hospital that the institution was quite full and rather busy at present. Receipt of sheets for the children's ward and other linen from Hill 60 Chapter, Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire, was acknowledged. The newly ordered mattresses were now in use and were greatly appreciated by the patients. Miss Harrison recently returned to duty following her annual vacation spent in Winnipeg.

Walter Longwill had a letter before the hospital board last night asking for consideration in connection with the giving of plumbing work at the hospital and the opportunity of tendering on a share of the business. The secretary was instructed to write to Mr. Longwill pointing out that he had already had the opportunity to tender on hospital work.

The house committee, W. M. Brown, chairman, reported at the regular monthly meeting of the hospital board last night that a rather bad leak had developed in the ceiling of the operating room floor during the heavy rainstorm a few days ago, necessary steps to make repairs have been taken. The old laundry stove had burned out and had been replaced with a second hand cook stove.
