Coal Orders For Hospital

Philpott & Evitt and Albert & McCaffery to Get Business From Hospital Board

The hospital board, at its regular monthly meeting last night, accepted tenders from Philpott & Evitt for supply of Bulkley Valley slack and Vancouver Island double screened lump coal to the hospital and nurses' home...

Tenders were: C. C. Ketchum—Bulkley Valley slack, \$5.85; double screened lump, \$10.40.

Philpott & Evitt—Nanaimo-Wellington double screened lump, \$11.60; mine run, \$10.60; Bulkley Valley slack, \$5.75; double screened lump, \$10.40.

Albert & McCaffery—Nanaimo-Wellington lump, \$11.75; mine run, \$10.75; Bulkley Valley slack, \$6.00; lump, \$10.30.

The board decided to accept the lowest tenders in each case. There was a communication from F. M. Dockrill of Telkwa urging the merits of Bulkley Valley coal for stove as well as furnace use. Further tests will be made in the hospital kitchen range.

Milk Supply The board awarded the hospital milk and cream supply for the coming year to Valentin Dairy. The following bids were considered:

Prince Rupert Dairy—milk, 35¢ per gallon; table cream, 50¢ per quart, 25¢ per pint, 12½¢ per half pint; whipping cream, 70¢ per quart, 35¢ per pint, 20¢ per half pint.

Valentin Dairy—milk, 33¢ per gallon; table cream, 50¢, 25¢ and 12½¢; whipping cream, 75¢, 40¢ and 20¢.

The Dominion Dairy offered no tender.

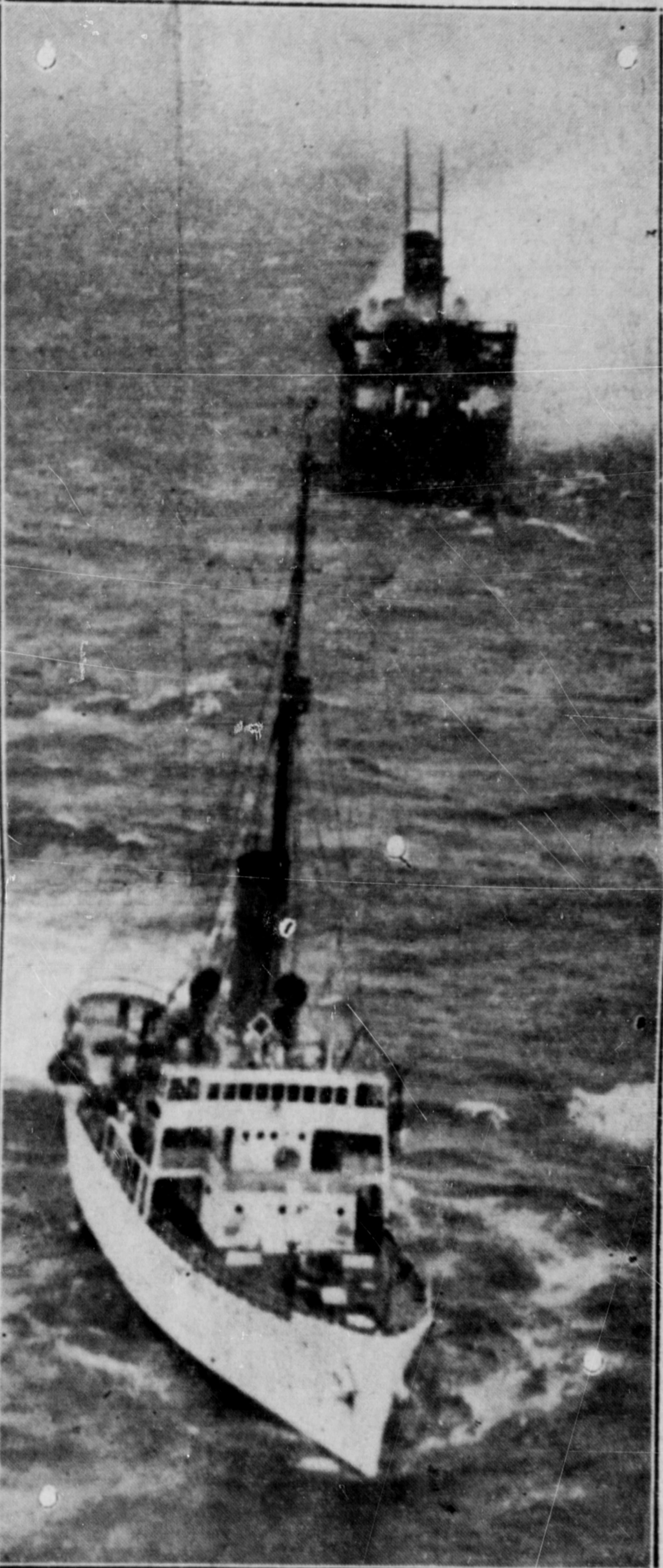
OPEN TO VISITORS

CUTTING SERVICE

One Boat a Week to Vancouver By C. N. R. After October 1

Effective October 1 the Canadian National Steamships coastal service will operate on regular weekly fall schedule. The steamer Prince George, Capt. H. E. Nedden, will make the run from Vancouver to Prince Rupert, Anyox, Stewart and waypoints.

Arriving time at Prince Rupert northbound will be 10 a.m. Wednesdays and departure from Prince Rupert southbound will be at 10.30 p.m. Thursdays to arrive in Vancouver at 1:30 p.m. Saturday afternoon.

The steamer Prince Rupert will be withdrawn from service. Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Brown, who were married recently in the city, will be leaving in a day or so for Kitkatla where they will make their home.

Peacetime Navy Work

Commanders of Two Visiting Canadian Destroyers Speakers Before Gyro Club at Luncheon

While the primary peacetime function of the navy is to prepare for war, by keeping itself at all times in practice, it also performs a variety of other useful duties such as policing the seas, protecting British interests and people abroad in time of disaster or emergency, providing relief in the event of calamity and, not least of all, "showing the flag," which is a most effective way of advertising.

With reference to the policing of the seas, Lieut. Commander Houghton mentioned among other activities of the navy, the keeping down of piracy and suppressing of gun running and drug traffic. He gave incidents with which he had been personally associated where Canadian warcraft had been called upon to protect British interests and subjects during uprisings in foreign lands.

Commander Oland Commander J. E. W. Oland R.C.N., D.S.C. of H.M.C.S. Skeena was also a speaker at the luncheon.

Capt. Sinclair Pierce and Crew Escape and Land at Queen Charlotte City Unhurt

A brief message received here this morning announced the total destruction by fire off Buck Point west coast of Queen Charlotte Islands, yesterday morning of the well known local halibut boat Eric Roy, Capt. Sinclair (Red) Pierce, which was engaged in black cod fishing for the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. Capt. Pierce and his crew consisting of Gunnar Anderson, Frank Long, Percy Pierce and Tom Banbury made their escape from the burning vessel and were safe at Queen Charlotte City last night.

From there it is expected they will come on here aboard a fish packer and may arrive today or tomorrow. There were no details of the incident but it is believed that there were no serious injuries. There was insurance on the Eric Roy.

The Eric Roy was 43 feet 5 inches in length, 13 foot 2 inches beam and 6 feet 3 inches deep. The vessel was equipped with a 30 h.p. Enterprise gasoline engine. She was built here in 1926 for Frederick T. Blundon from whom she was acquired some years ago by Capt. Pierce.

ELECTED PRIMATE

Bishop D. T. Owen of Toronto Is New Head of Church of England in Canada

MONTREAL, September 19 (Canadian Press)—Rt. Rev. D. T. Owen, Bishop of Toronto, was elected Primate of the Church of England in Canada yesterday succeeding the late Most Rev. Charles L. Worrell, Archbishop of Nova Scotia. The election was by the House of Bishops of Canada.
