BRITISH COLUMBIA'S CLAIM

When Premier Pattullo was getting ready to go to Ottawa to ask for financial aid in his work and wages and interest reduction schemes, he investigated the amount of money collected by the Federal Government in the province and the total expenditures and he found that during the past five years the Dominion had collected twenty million dollars more than it had expended in the province. The money had been expended in public works in the east. This was one of the great arguments for British Columbia in asking for consideration.

In view of the situation British Columbia can ask for what she needs without appearing in the aspect of a mendicant. Some newspapers in the east criticized the western provinces recently for trying to make raids on the federal treasury, when as a matter of fact the east has been levying tribute on the west regularly for five years.

It is expected that there will be more winter yet, but the frost will not injure the bulbs. Perennials are more likely to get a bad setback if the frost is severe and if it should come without snow. So far the snow has been a great protection to the gardens. That is why today the lawns are all green, and everything has a spring-like appearance.

RANGERS IN LEAD AGAIN

Defeated Boston Bruins Last Night; Black Hawks Also Win and Detroit Has Draw

NEW YORK, Jan. 29. (CP)—As a result of a victory over the lowly Boston Bruins here last night, the New York Rangers regained exclusive possession of first place in the American Division of the National Hockey League. The Detroit Red Wings, who played a draw with the Canadiens at Detroit, are in second place while the Chicago Black Hawks, who blanked the Toronto Maple Leafs at the Windy City, remained in third position.

The Canadiens, by virtue of the draw with the Red Wings, crept back into second place in the International Division with a scant one point lead over the Montreal Maroons who have been going exceptionally strong of late.
