INTERNATIONAL DEBT IS CONSIDERED

OUTLOOK BRIGHT FOR SKEENA SALMON CANNING SEASON

Washington Has Latest British Note Regarding Obligations in Review

No New Developments Owing to Absence From Capitol of Cabinet Members—London Places Situation Squarely Before Uncle Sam

WASHINGTON, D.C., July 5: (CP)—There have been no new developments during the past few days in connection with the international debt situation owing to the absence from the Capitol of practically all members of the administration. For a while yesterday, Miss Frances Perkins, secretary of labor, was the only member of the cabinet in Washington, it being the first time in the history of the United States that a woman was the only principal executive of the land to be left in charge.

A new British note cabled recently to the British embassy in Washington in which the British government emphasized its desire to negotiate a permanent war debts settlement with the United States is under consideration.

The British note turned down United States suggestions that payments might be made in kind.

The British government stressed in the message that the primary question is the amount of money that should be paid and that it will welcome the opportunity of resuming discussions.

The note pointed to German reparations payments in kind to show that such have an unstabilizing effect.

Seventy-Five Houses in Philadelphia Area to Quit Under Church Boycott

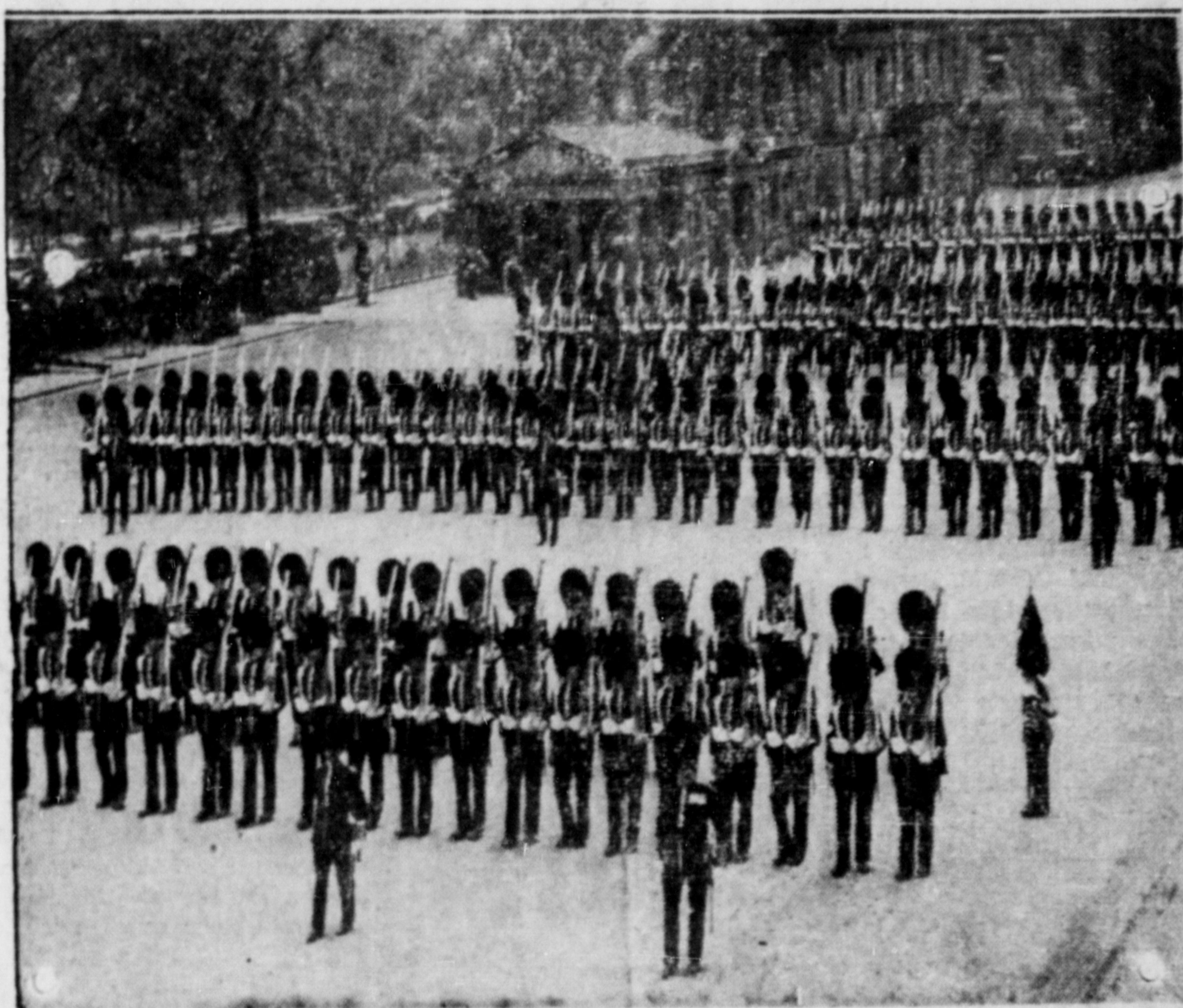

OPENING UP OF 'FRISCO

New York Stock Mart Unsettled

One Day Up and Next Down Seems To Be Rule in Erratic and Irregular Trading

NEW YORK, July 5.—Stock movements continue to be erratic on the New York Stock Exchange. In yesterday's session values were irregularly lower with losses running to more than one point in some sections of the list following the week-end collapse when prices closed from fractions to two points lower in very dull trading. During the previous couple of days, values had rallied for good gains with industrialists showing the widest advances. On the whole, the market appears to be still very unsettled.

Cunningham, prominent pioneer business man of Port Essington, who is a business visitor in Prince Rupert today. "The start has been the best in years and all depends now upon the weather which I believe should be good."

ELIMINATE VON PAPEN

Hitler Government Being Reorganized—Belgium on Guard

BERLIN, July 5.—Latest outstanding developments in the German situation include a plan to reorganize the Hitler government by eliminating Vice-Chancellor Franz von Papen and reiteration of the announcement by the Chancellor that summary trials and firing squads by which the attempted revolt of storm troop leaders was crushed are no longer in effect although the country is under a virtual state of military dictatorship.

Interest attached to the dramatic meeting at Neudeck in East Prussia between President Paul von Hindenburg and his former lance-corporal, Chancellor Hitler, but the real object of the meeting was not disclosed.

Belgium on Guard

BRUSSELS, Belgium, July 5.—Owing to the tense situation in internal Germany, the Belgian government has ordered reinforcements into the two provinces on the border awarded her under the Treaty of Versailles.

POLICE AND REDS CLASH

Trouble in Toronto Following Release of Sam Carr From Penitentiary

TORONTO, July 5.—The return to this city of Sam Carr, one of eight Communist leaders who were sent to Portsmouth Penitentiary several years ago, was the direct cause of a brief but violent clash between police and 1500 Communist sympathizers here.

Carr, whose real name is Sam Cohen, and Matthew Popovitch were released at the end of last week from the penitentiary at Kingston on ticket of leave after serving half of five year sentences for being members of an unlawful assembly.
