United States May Soon Rank With China and India as Consumer—Floating Supply in Country Considerably Less Than One Billion Ounces Which Treasury Requires

NEW YORK, Aug. 10: (CP)—Silver climbed back to a position of monetary importance in the Western Hemisphere today for the first time in sixty years and it was predicted that, if the United States should carry out its plan to buy enough silver to equal twenty-five percent of the total metallic reserves, it would begin to rank with China and India as a consumer of the white metal. The floating supply of silver in the country is believed to be considerably less than the one billion ounces which the Treasury may have to obtain to complete its program. In some quarters it is believed the government may be forced to make heavy purchases abroad with a resultant boost in price.

The price of silver on the New York metal market today climbed to 48¢ per ounce.

Famous Canadian General Here On Pensions Duties

GENERAL Sir Richard Turner V.C., K.C.B., K.C.M.G., D.S.O., commander of the Third Highland Brigade in France during part of the Great War and later in command of all Canadian troops in British Isles, is a visitor in Prince Rupert today in his capacity as a member of the Pensions Board which held a session at the Court House this morning to hear local cases. Sir Richard, who is one of the British Empire's most celebrated military men, having won the Victoria Cross in the South African War, is accompanied by Lady Turner. They make their home in Ottawa. They were met on arrival this morning aboard the Prince Rupert from Vancouver by Col. S. D. Johnston, officer commanding the First North B.C. Regiment, 102nd Battalion, and Capt. J. S. Wilson, both of whom served under Sir Richard with the Third Brigade in France during the Great War.

Other members of the Pensions Board party include Dr. L. Robert, medical examiner, Ottawa, accompanied by Mrs. Robert, W. K. Campbell, Ottawa, and Walter Drinnan, Vancouver, the last mentioned being pensions advocate.

Olof Hanson is Renominated Unanimously as Candidate Of Liberals For Skeena Riding

On the unanimous vote of the convention of Liberals of Skeena riding this morning Olof Hanson was unanimously re-nominated as candidate to contest the constituency in the Liberal interests at the next federal election. Officers of the district association were elected and an executive committee named to assist in the re-election of the present member and to look after the interests of Liberalism generally throughout the constituency.

It was decided on suggestion of the same place that the convention favor the calling of a general convention of the party for the whole of Canada to adopt a platform for the party.

Making Nomination

The nomination of Mr. Hanson was made by G. W. Nickerson who said it was almost five years since he was first nominated. He had proved to be a hard working member and had secured a good deal for the district. It was probable that during his next term there would be a Liberal government in power and he would have an opportunity of carrying out some of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's ideas. The railway company had made no effort to develop Prince Rupert and the train service was slower than it was a few years ago. In the House of Commons Mr. Hanson had said that neither of the past governments had played fair with Prince Rupert.

SCALE IS MOUNTING

Log Production in District This Year So Far Four Times More Than in 1933

July Well Ahead

Output of Poles, Piling and Railway Ties in Interior Also Shows Lead Over Year Ago

Log scaling in Prince Rupert forestry district during the month of July maintained the very substantial increase which is being consistently built up month by month for 1934 as compared with recent years. The scale for this July totalled 16,465,626 board feet as compared with 14,544,772 board feet in June this year and 10,590,238 board feet in July of last year. So far this year the log scale has reached a total of 52,446,181 board feet as against 13,582,932 board feet in the first seven months of 1933.

Forest Products

Output of forest products this year is also showing a healthy increase over 1933. This July the production of poles and piling amounted to 152,077 lineal feet, of which 88,876 lineal feet was cedar and 63,201 lineal feet hemlock, as compared with 53,460 lineal feet in the same month last year. Cordwood for this July amounted to 557 cords as against 335 cords in July 1933. The counted output of ties in July this year was 63,464 pieces—2,094 hemlock and 61,370 jackpine—as against 12,121 pieces last July.
