Exceeds 1933 by About Fifty Percent-Rainfall Still Heavier . So Far in 1934

The city of Prince Rupert has had a total of 924.9 hours of bright sunshine so far this year as compared with but 622.9 hours in the same period of last year. Sunshine totalling 101.4 hours this September compared with 82.5 hours in September 1933.

Precipitation for this September amounted to 9.85 inches in comparison with 9.3 inches in the same month last year, bringing precipitation for the first nine months o with 56.75 inches in the first nine months of 1933.
