Insull and Sixteen Others Are Acquitted by Chicago Jury on Mail Fraud Charge

CHICAGO, Nov. 26: (CP)—After deliberating for two hours and two minutes on Saturday, twelve Federal Court jurors brought in a verdict of acquittal in the government's charges of \$100,000,000 mail fraud against Samuel Insull and sixteen business associates who had been cited as co-defendants.

"This is the start of my vindication," exclaimed Insull after hearing the verdict.

Another charge of embezzlement involving the same company—Insull's ill-fated Corporation Securities Company—is still pending against him as well as against his brother, Martin, and son, Samuel jr.
