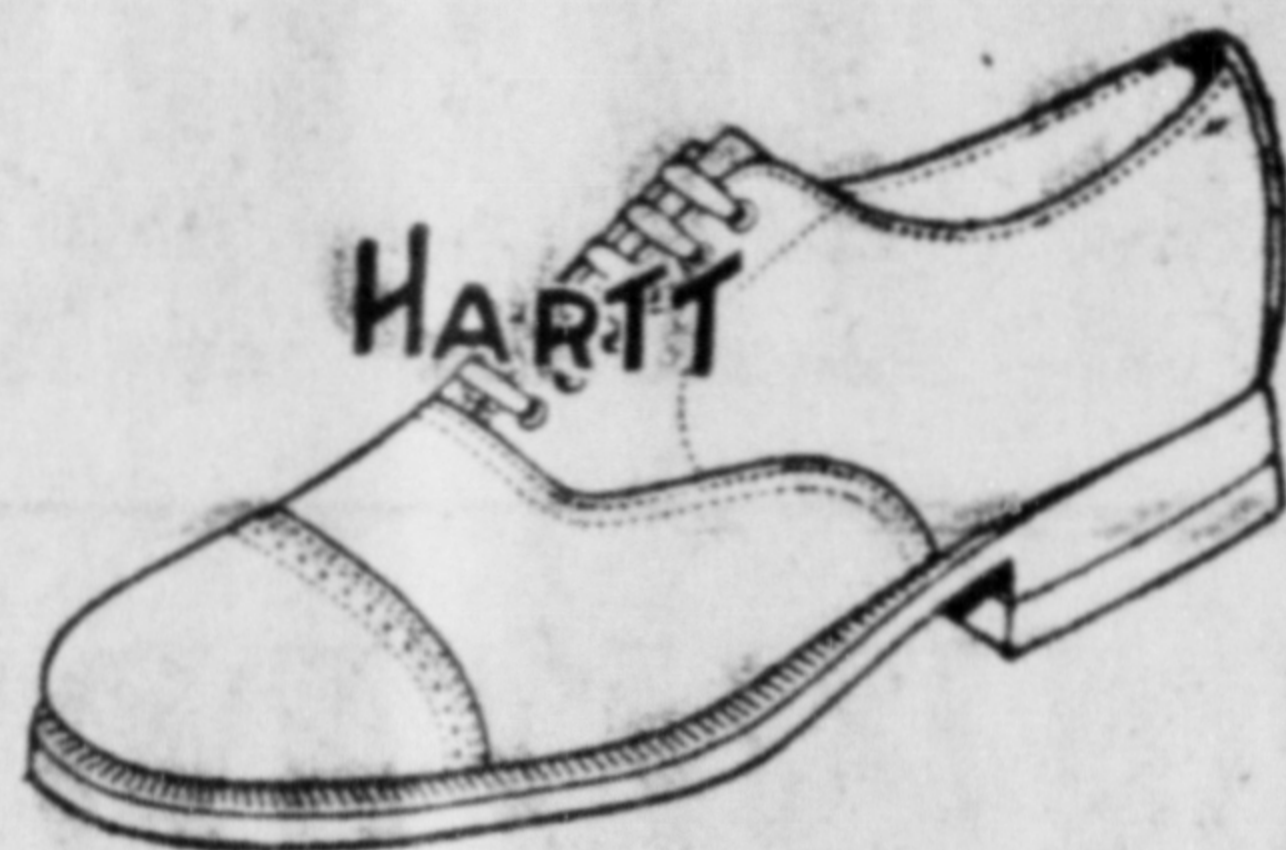

EXHIBIT OF GAME

Bedaux Plans to Take Northern B. C. Display to Paris

A permanent display in Paris of the most complete collection of British Columbia game in existence is planned by Charles E. Bedaux, French sportsman and explorer, who, with an expedition, is crossing the Rocky Mountains by tractor this summer.

M. Bedaux hopes to collect and have mounted one specimen of each type of game in the province. These will be placed on permanent exhibition in the Citroen Museum in the French capital.

Moose, caribou, sheep and goat groups will be displayed in their natural surroundings. Photographs will be taken during the trip to be used in the working out of the backgrounds so that the mounted groups will blend into scenic arrangements identical with the country where the game lived.

Fifty-thousand feet of moving picture film of northern British Columbia will be taken.

WHAT THE PREMIER SAID

Editor, Daily News:—
May I trespass on your space to bring home to the people of this part of the country how sadly the Dominion Premier has fallen since the last election? At that time, to be exact, on June 12, 1930, at his home town of Calgary he said:

"I am convinced that unemployment has now ceased to be local and provincial and has become national in its importance. This is a new country and there is no excuse for unemployment if a government does its duty. I will not permit this country with my voice or vote ever to become committed to the dole system. I will not permit those to share in any benefits that may accrue unless they are willing to work and my duty is to provide them with work to do. There are great national works that may be undertaken in times of stress and strain. They will be taken and I promise that Parliament shall formulate a definite plan of permanent relief and that Parliament shall deal with this national problem and provide amelioration in order that next winter the Canadian people may not be facing the crisis that is upon us without having a remedy on hand."

Evidently Premier Pattullo has been urging Premier Bennett to keep his word, to carry out his pledges and provide the promised remedy.
