TITLES ONCE MORE

Premier Bennett is determined to force titles upon Canada once more. He announced at the end of the year that he had made recommendations that certain titles be granted and these recommendations have been carried out.

The decision that Canada did not wish her citizens to bear titles was arrived at by the Parliament of Canada and has not been revoked. We think the Premier was taking too much on himself to act in opposition to the House of Commons resolution.

The man on the street seems to be of opinion that the Premier is anxious for a title for himself and that he is paving the way for it by recommending that others get them. This may or may not be true. What is true is that there has been a resumption of an obnoxious custom.

WELL DESERVED RECOGNITION

We are not now objecting to any particular person getting recognition. All we object to is the principle of singling out special persons and conferring on them a title which tends to foster a system of snobbery. We have only to look back at the selections that have been made in the past, both in Canada and Great Britain to see where the evil lies. So great has been the scandal in Britain that many of the country's best men have absolutely refused to accept any titles.

One of the recent recognitions which is well deserved and will be backed up by popular acclaim is that of Miss Davies to be a member of the Order of the British Empire. This carries with it no title. Miss Lawson of Victoria who is also recognized was for years secretary of the Friendly Help Society.

CASE FOR WORKLESS

Premier Pattullo Received Delegation From Local Unemployed

Premier T. D. Pattullo received a delegation of the unemployed yesterday morning consisting of O. White, C. Chapman, P. Lapotte, F. Carr and E. Anderson. A memorandum outlining grievances of the local unemployed was presented which the premier retained for consideration and reference.

Grievances set forth by the delegates covered the pressing need for government provision of boots and clothing, question of comparative food costs in Prince Rupert and other points in the province, provision for medical and dental treatment, need of a hot mid-day meal being served at school for the benefit of undernourished children, hardship imposed on families having deductions made in relief allowances for rent and the serious result of the policy of classing grown children as dependents and granting them only \$2.50 a month for subsistence.

The premier gave sympathetic attention to the delegation and promised at the conclusion of the interview, to give the matter his serious consideration.

Summary of Grievances

The following was a summary of grievances, immediate and pressing, which the committee presented:

"Question of clothing for the unemployed and dependents: For the past two years no provision has been made, either governmental or municipal, for the supplying of clothing to the majority of the unemployed of Prince Rupert, only a comparative few of the single unemployed having been permitted to work in exchange for a meagre relief allowance of clothing.

"Question of provincial relief policy ignoring the comparative high cost of food in this district: This question has been brought repeatedly to the attention of provincial authority without recognition having been shown.

"Deductions in relief allowance for rent to certain families: As the total relief allowance is inadequate, the policy of reducing the allowance in order to satisfy landlords who insist on claiming relief rent makes an added hardship on those affected.

"Undernourished school children of the unemployed: It is the opinion of this committee that a plan whereby these children could be provided with a hot mid-day meal at school would do much to mitigate their condition.

"Medical and dental treatment of the unemployed: The medical treatment granted is dependent on the charity of local doctors with the result that only the most imperative cases receive attention as for dental treatment received, it is negligible from any source.

"Question of grown children who are classed as dependents and as such receive \$2.50 a month for subsistence: Of all the anomalies of relief administration, this practice, which forces a grown person to encroach upon the meagre allowance of parents in order to subsist, is the most glaring and indefensible.

"Attitude of the City Commissioner and Government Agent to the needs of the unemployed: The attitude of the City Commissioner to the needs of the unemployed is one of indifference, his invariable reply to all solicitations made on their behalf being that there are no government or municipal funds at his disposal for any such purposes as required. The local Government Agent, though sympathetic to the needs of the unemployed, is circumscribed by his instructions from Victoria which, in turn, has to this date showed indifference to any and all the grievances of the unemployed as here set forth."

SECRETARY HAS QUIT

Woodin Finally Resigns as Head of U. S. Treasury—Morgenthau His Successor

WASHINGTON, D.C., Jan. 2.—The long-expected resignation of Secretary of the Treasury William H. Woodin became a fact yesterday with the announcement of President Franklin D. Roosevelt that the document had been in his hands for the last two weeks and had now been accepted.

Henry Morgenthau jr., who has been acting Secretary of the Treasury since it became necessary some weeks ago for Mr. Woodin to relinquish his duties owing to ill-health, has been permanently appointed Secretary of the Treasury.

year just ended included \$16,290,75 on buildings and \$7700 on contents and all but \$600 was covered by insurance. During the year 1933 there was a total of 104 calls as against 8 calls in 1932.

During the month of December there were no less than nineteen calls as compared with four in the same month of 1932. The most serious fire in December was that which destroyed the residence of William Inglis, Park Avenue, with loss of \$2500 protected by insurance.
