Dominion Government Accepts 48.49c. Bids In White Metal Deal

Is Expected to Have Effect of Stiffening Price of White Metal in Canada—Transaction is Sequel to United States Nationalization

OTTAWA, Aug. 22: (CP)-The Dominion government has accepted tenders for the purchase of 220,000 ounces of silver at an average price of 48.49c per ounce in Canadian funds, the Department of Finance announced today. The transaction is expected to have the tendency of stiffening the price for silver in Canada and is a sequel to the recent move of the United States in nationalizing silver.
