

BUY SEEDS NOW table and flower seeds and a good a good start. many stores also carry standard lines of fertilizer, all of which are useful for this season of the year. with lawns will require some kind of clipper for keeping the edges neat. Mowers need overhauling and grinding. If the mower cuts well the mowing is much lighter and the lawn looks much neater.

### SOW FLOWER SEEDS

Those not planning to buy their seedlings this year should sow in boxes within the next week or two. This should insure strong plants before the middle or end of May when they are planted outside in the beds. Only a few varieties such as pansies should be planted out before that time. Frost or even snow is liable to come at any time in April. People who want only a dozen seedlings of one kind would be better advised to purchase them when needed. Some seeds can be sown in the open in April but it is usually a great advantage to sow
