The prime movers who would bring about political and social revolution, regardless of who is hurt in the upheaval, are the leaders of these groups. Most of the supporters of the movements do not really want a revolution but they argue that conditions cannot be any worse and they may be better. They do not realize that an excess of socialism always brings about a dictatorship and that bloodshed has followed or accompanied every revolution, no matter how peaceful may have been the declarations of the revolution-

On the other hand most people recognize that we cannot continue as in the past. There must be changes but the changes must come about gradually and in a constitutional way. Extreme wealth must be curbed, manipulations for the purpose of robbing the people must be checked. Arrangements must be made so that when there is an abundance of food and clothing in the country there shall be none hungry and without decent clothes. This can all be brought about without a dangerous revolution, such as that suggested by the extremists. It will be brought about by a system of regulation as opposed to confiscation.






