WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

Union steamer Cardena, Capt. A. E. Dickson, returned to port at 8:45 this morning from Anyox. Stewart and other northern points and sailed at 1:30 this afternoon for Vancouver and waypoints. The Cardena will revert next week to her regular run on the Vancouver-Bella Coola-Ocean Falls-Skeena River-Prince Rupert route after having been relieving for the past three weeks on the Vancouver-Prince Rupert-Anyox-Stewart route for the steamer Catala which has been undergoing annual overhaul at Vancouver and which will be back in service next week, calling here Sunday afternoon northbound. The steamer Venture, which has been relieving on the Cardena's run, will be making her last trip this week.

C. C. S. Givenchy, which has been assigned to patrol of the halibut grounds prior to the opening of the 1934 fishing season, was in port yesterday for coal and supplies.

The local halibut boat Capella, Capt. Dan Larsen, has been chartered to take a local all-star girls' basketball team on a trip to Anyox late this week for a series of two games. Departure will be made from here at 6 o'clock Thursday night and a game will be played at Port Simpson that night on the way to Anyox. Games are to be played at Anyox Friday and Saturday nights and the party is due back from the north on Sunday.

The following figures of interest in connection with halibut production, export and consumption of Canada have been compiled in connection with discussions as to why there should or should not be such a great spread in the prices paid for American and Canadian halibut.

- Total catch of Canadian halibut, 6,750,100 pounds.
- Export of Canadian halibut, 1,392,300 pounds.
- Halibut re-imported to Canada, 488,323 pounds.
- Net exports of Canadian halibut, 903,977 pounds.
- Export of Canadian halibut to countries other than the United States, 75,800 pounds.
- Export of Canadian halibut to United States, 528,177 pounds.
- Net consumption of halibut in Canada, 7,647,300 pounds.
- As the large proportion of Canadian halibut is consumed in Canada, fishermen are at a loss to understand why United States halibut should bring a greater price than Canadian in Canada as it is not apparent that the Canadian retail price is any lower than in United States.


