### EMPLOYING SWEATED LABOR

At a recent meeting of the Trades and Labor Council cognizance was taken of a firm employing non-union labor and it was hinted that action might be taken detrimental to the firm mentioned. There was no suggestion in the published report that sweated labor was employed.

The Parliamentary Commission at Ottawa inquiring into the activities of the chain and mail order stores a few days ago elicited the information that the T. Eaton Company employed girls in their factories who earned only eight cents an hour. Here we suggest is an opportunity for the activities of organized labor. By means of sweated labor and mass buying, the mail order houses can outsell firms doing business in a legitimate manner, people who buy from them are encouraging the employment of girls at eight cents an hour. They are the people who are responsible for the conditions which exist in these factories because they refuse to deal with local firms who are trying to do business in an honest way, giving good service and good values but instead send away their money to fill the coffers of the merchant princes in the east who fatten on the sweated labor in their factories and on the union workers who support them.

This is not mentioned in any spirit of hostility to the local Trades and Labor Council which is, doubtless, doing its best to protect labor conditions in the west but, when members of that council or the people they represent send orders to the mail order houses which employ sweated labor, they are injuring the cause of honest labor and weakening their own influence in the community.

### WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

With a capacity list of passengers, most of whom were round trip tourists, C. N. R. steamer Prince Rupert, Capt. Neil McLean, making the first Alaska sailing of the season for the company, arrived in port bright and early at 8:45 this morning from Vancouver, Powell River and Ocean Falls and sailed at 1 o'clock this afternoon for Skagway and other northern points whence she is due to return here at 8 o'clock next Monday morning and sail at 3 p.m. for Vancouver via Ocean Falls and Powell River. Under summer schedule, the steamer Prince George, Capt. H. E. Neden, will be here Friday morning from the south and will sail that afternoon for Anyox and Stewart, returning here southbound Saturday evening.

The Ketchikan schooner Eskimo, Capt. Sayles, arrived in port at 8:45 this morning from the "First City" with one carload of frozen fish for transshipment to the United States over the Canadian National Railways. After discharging, the vessel sailed on her return north.

Edward Mabbs, arrived in Massett Inlet at 8 o'clock this morning from Skidegate Inlet and is making her calls there today after which she will cross to Oceanic cannery with a party of Indian cannery workers from the Islands before arriving here possibly at about 8 o'clock tomorrow morning.

### TINY DEER IS RESCUED

Week-Old Fawn Picked Up On Railway Track and Is Now In Town—Mother Had Disappeared

Walking along the railroad track about a mile this side of Kaien station on Monday afternoon a guest at the Royal Hotel here noticed in a culvert a tiny fawn, believed to be not over a week old, which he carried into town and which is now being kept at the hotel prior to being turned over to the authorities. The pedestrian saw no sign of the doe which it is believed might have been chased or killed by wolves. The tiny animal was quite helpless and, no doubt, would have perished had it been left there.

With only partial measure of success, it is now being coaxed to take nourishment in the form of cow's milk from a nipple-attached bottle.

Local nimrods who are interested in the stocking of Dundas Island with deer have been informed and it is possible that the fawn—a doe—may be liberated there when it is large enough to fend for itself. A buck, which has been kept for the past year or so at the Knox Hotel, has already been secured for this purpose and, indeed, a mate had been sought. This may be the solution.

### RATE CASE PRESENTED

Chamber of Commerce Committee Tells Railway Commission Official Why Auto Charge Should be Cut

A memorandum setting forth Prince Rupert's case for a reduction in the rates for shipment of automobiles between Prince Rupert and Terrace and Hazelton on the Canadian National Railways was presented to A. LeSage of Calgary, inspector of transportation, of the Board of Railway Commissioners, by the highway committee of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce consisting of S. E. Parker, chairman, C. H. Orme, W. O. Fulton and V. S. Moore at a conference this morning between Mr. LeSage and the committee.

Mr. LeSage, who came to Prince Rupert especially to go into this matter, arrived from Calgary on last night's train. He will leave this evening for Hazelton and will come back to visit Terrace before returning to Calgary.

### 'FRISCO TO OPEN SOON

Mayor Rossi Expects Shipping Tie-Up To End Very Shortly Under Arbitration Arrangement

SAN FRANCISCO, June 20—Under an arrangement for arbitration of the dispute between longshoremen and the shipping interests, Mayor Angelo Rossi stated yesterday that he hoped to have the port of San Francisco open for shipping again very soon. The announcement of the mayor followed a conference with longshore and shipping representatives.

Re-opening of the Port of Portland is expected within forty-eight hours with five hundred special police protecting strike-breakers.

Seattle also expected to be handling shipping again on a normal basis in the very near future, two hundred extra police having been sworn in for waterfront patrol service there.

### RETURN FROM OLD COUNTRY

Col. J. W. ### Horses For Rainy Hollow District Sent From Here

Leaving here this afternoon for Alaska, the steamer Prince Rupert had on board William Teere of Niton, Alta., who is taking into a Rainy Hollow mining country of Northern British Columbia twenty-three packhorses which will be used in connection with prospecting activity in that area this summer. Accompanied by two other men, Mr. Teere arrived here with the horses from Alberta at the end of last week. The Prince Rupert will make a special call at Haines, Alaska, to unload the horses.

### STRIKE OF INTERNES

Montreal House Doctors Go Back to Work After Jewish Colleague Resigns His Post

MONTREAL, June 20: (CP)—The storm centre of a strike of seventy-five internes in five Montreal French-Canadian hospitals, Dr. Sam Rabinovitch has resigned as an interne at Notre Dame Hospital and the striking house doctors immediately re-applied for their positions and got them. The internes had refused to work as long as Rabinovitch, who is a Jew, was employed.
