## NO SETTLEMENT IN CONNECTION WITH STEEL DISPUTE YET

## France Doubles Impost On Feed Mixtures and Flour From Dominion

New Rate of 160 Instead of 80 Francs Per Quintal to Come Into Effect Tomorrow Under Decree Issued Today By Government at Paris

PARIS, June 15: (CP)—The French government today issued a decree doubling the tariff on Canadian wheat, wheat and rye mixtures, seeds and flour. The increased tariffs become effective tomorrow. The rate is being advanced from eighty to one hundred and sixty francs per quintal. The change in the tariff on Canadian feed follows new international trade agreements recently negotiated by France.
