We are in a very vulnerable position and we should feel much more comfortable if the port of Prince Rupert were suitably fortified. Forts at Victoria do not help us in the least. Many Prince Rupert boys belong to the Naval Reserve but that is not sufficient. Our two tiny warships would avail little if we were attacked. We thoroughly agree with the sentiment that war is hell but we would hate to have to run and leave our homes if our coast were invaded.

The fact that several fliers have dropped out indicates that either they or their machines were not near enough perfect to be able to stand the strain of the long flights.
