PORT DARWIN, Australia, Oct. 22: (CP)—Smashing all records for the flight from England to Australia, the British team of C. W. A. Scott and Campbell Black landed at Port Darwin today and, after making repairs to their engine, hopped off for Charleville, 1400 miles away.
