



Rites for Former Secretary of the Treasury in New York Followed By Pennsylvania Burial

NEW YORK, May 10: (CP)-Funeral of the late William Hartman Woodin, former Secretary of the Treasury in the Roosevelt administration, whose death occurred last Thursday night, took place here. Following a largely attended service at Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church, at which national, state, metropolitan, business and industrial leaders were present, to pay final tributes, the remains were taken to Berwick, Penn., where interment was made quietly in the family plot.

Industrialist, banker, collector of coins and art, composer of symphonic music and former republican in politics, Woodin was little known to the general public when he was selected as secretary of the treasury at the start of the democratic administration of Franklin D. Rodsevelt.

His business career began with a job at 90 cents a day in the foundry of Jackson & Woodin, a railroad equipment firm which his! grandfather helped to found and CHICAGO, May 10:-A complete of which his father was president. Later this concern was absorbed by the American Car & Foundry company and in 1922 he became president of the big cornoration. He was prominently identified with other large corporations.

Despite the size and varied scope of his business interests, he found leisure to compose music that was played by some of the leading orchestras of the world. His "Oriental! 
