

### Ice-Box Cake

• Combine % c. melted shortening and 1 c. light corn syrup. Beat in 2 eggs. Sift together 2 c. sifted all-purpose flour, 4 tsps. Magic Baking Powder, 1/2 tsp. salt; add alternately with 3/3 c. milk and 1 tsp. vanilla extract to first mixture stirring well after each addition. Bake in 2 greased 9" layer pans in 350°F. oven 25-30 min. Cool, halve each layer lengthwise making 4 layers.

Lemon Filling: Blend 41/2 tbs. flour with 1/2 c. water to make smooth paste. Add 34 c. water and 1/2 c. corn syrup. Cook,

ly until thickened. Beat egg yolk; gradually add cooked mixture to it. Return to heat; cook 1 min. lemon rind, 1/8 c. juice. Spread between layers and on top of cake. Chill. Top with white icing.
