The book says: "To deter- batting averages, divide 'times at bat' into the number of base hits but

never into the total bases on hits." However, there are a few things to know about what "times at bat" means, and what constitutes a hit.

The book states that "a time at bat" shall not be charged against a batsman who is awarded first base by the umpire on called balls or when he makes a sacrifice hit or for interference by the catcher." That means that, if a player is up to bat four times but is given a "walk," he is charged with only three times at bat.

Now with regard to "hits." The rule book has this to say, "in no case shall a base hit be scored when a base-runner is forced out by the play." So the batsman gets no credit for his "hit." Another incident not known by some is the matter of getting to first base on an error, or a fielder's choice. In part the rule book states: "When a fielder, after handling a batted ball, elects to try to retire a base-runner instead of the batter, the play is known as a fielder's choice.

In case the runner is retired, or would have been retired but for an error, the batter shall be charged with a time at bat, but no hit. If the runner is not retired, and no error is made, the batter shall be charged with a time at bat, but no hit, provided he swung at the ball." So if a batter gets to first on his hit because a fielder commits an error, the batter is not credited with a hit.


