

WEDDED IN GREENVILLE

Miss Georgina Grace Davis Becomes Bride of Simon Peter Calder

GREENVILLE, Jan. 15.—Christmas Day, 1934 will long be remembered by the inhabitants of Greenville since, besides the usual Christmas festive celebrations, it was made auspicious by the nuptials of Miss Georgina Grace Davis, second daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Davis, and Simon Peter Calder, eldest son of Chief and Mrs. Peter C. Calder.

Even though the mercury had dropped to seven below zero with over eighteen inches of fresh snow blanketing the surroundings and a bitter north wind sweeping through the village, the festive spirit of the Greenville inhabitants could not be stayed.

At 3 p.m. the bridegroom and bride were escorted to St. Andrew's Church by their respective parties and members of the local band, where they were joined in holy matrimony by Rev. W. S. Cooper in the presence of a large gathering of friends.

The bride, presenting a radiant picture in her all-white gown of silk crepe with long ruffled sleeves and bodice of lace, a lovely veil of embroidered net caught at the back of her head held in place with bands of orange blossoms, and carrying a lovely bouquet of Madonna lilies, was given in marriage by her father, Charles Davis.

The matron of honor, Mrs. Johnson Russ, the bridesmaids, Misses Mamie Ward, Martha Robinson, Minnie Martin, Eliza Martin and Nellie Davis, and two little train-bearers, Misses Cora McNeil and Martha Alexander, who were all in white, added much beauty to the occasion.

Wedding Supper
After pictures of the bridal party had been taken everyone proceeded to the Community Hall where a delicious wedding supper was served to all people of the village, about two hundred and thirty in all.

The bridal table, centred with a small Christmas tree, was gaily and seasonably decorated. Covers were laid for seventeen; the newlyweds, Mr. and Mrs. Simon Calder, Rev. W. S. Cooper, Mrs. J. Hayhurst and daughter, Mrs. J. Russ, Misses Mamie Ward, Nellie Davis and Martha Robinson, and J. Hayhurst, James Leeson, Henry Aksidan, Frank Russ, Teddy Venn, Henry Robinson and Arthur Calder.

While supper was being served, Fred McKay led the Greenville Concert Band, of which the bridegroom is a popular member, in the playing of several selections, among them the following: Lohengrin's "Wedding March," "De Molay" and "Selections From 'Martha'."

During the supper, the lovely three-tier wedding cake, topped with a dainty spray of white flowers and tiny wedding bells, was cut by the bride, ably assisted by the groomsmen, Johnson Russ, newly elected chief councillor of Greenville. Assisting with the serving were Mrs. Chris Calder, Mrs. Fred McKay and Misses Minnie and Eliza Martin.

At the close of the meal, speeches of congratulation were made by Chief William Stephens, Chief Sam McKay, Chief Peter Calder, father of the groom, and Johnson Russ, Charles Alexander and Charles Davis, father of the bride.

The benediction was pronounced by Rev. W. S. Cooper, after which the hall was cleared and the bridal couple and their friends danced till midnight. About 1 a.m. between thirty and forty of the young men of the village chivared the happy couple, thus bringing to a close a memorable Christmas Day.

Timely Recipes

LIGHT DESSERTS
After Yuletide festivities, everyone needs a rest, particularly from heavy foods.
Stimulating salads, easily digested desserts should have a high place for a while now. They are good to look at, and good to eat when they are made of fine gelatine powders.

No dessert is more attractive or digestible than sparkling gelatine dishes. Even the youngest member of the family may enjoy them with great benefit.
Plain fruit gelatine powders, attractively moulded, and served with cream or custard sauces, make splendid desserts. They are delicious when moulded with fruit in unusual flavour combinations.

AMBER RUSSET
1 package quick-setting orange jelly powder;
4 tablespoons sugar;
1 1/2 cups warm prune juice;
Dash of salt;
Juice of lemon and maraschino cherry juice to make 1/2 cup.
Dissolve quick-setting jelly powder in 1 1/2 cups prune juice which is slightly warmer than lukewarm. Add sugar, salt, and fruit juices. Turn into individual moulds. Chill until firm. Unmould and serve with whipped cream. Serves 6.
