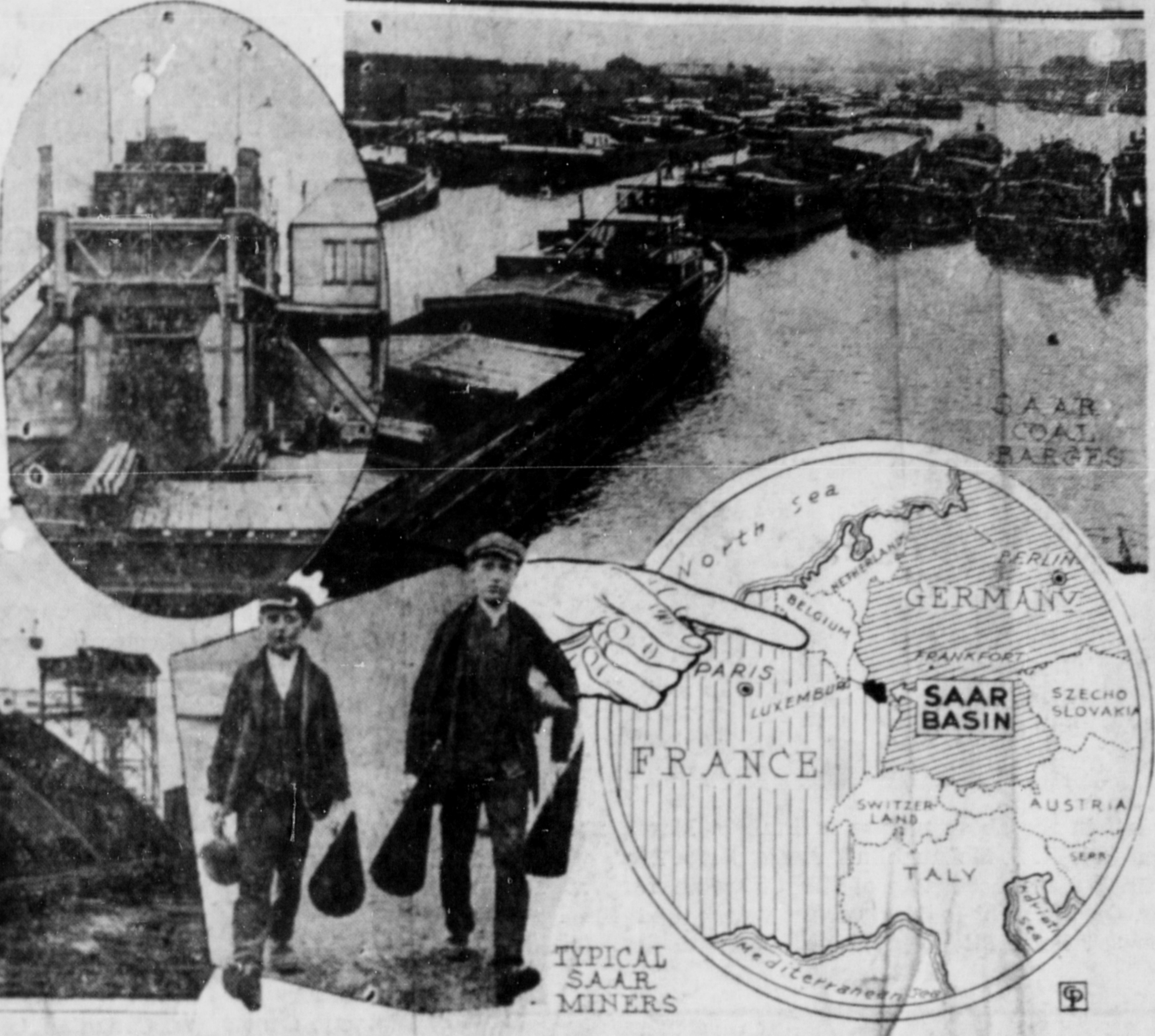

IRAQ'S GREAT OIL FLOW RELEASED TO WORLD MARKETS

The Saar Basin

SAAR FOR GERMANY

Saarbrücken, Jan. 15:—Announcement was made early this morning that Saarland had voted overwhelmingly to join Germany in the plebiscite of Sunday, counting of votes in which was completed late last night. There was a Nazi victory of more than ninety percent, the result being as follows: for Germany, 476,089; for France, 2,083; for status quo under League of Nations, 46,613. Special precautions are being taken against anti-Nazi demonstrations. Thousands of thrifty Saarlanders were today banking their gold francs in French banks, particularly in Metz, before the territory is turned back to Germany and their money is converted into depreciated German marks. The Saar committee of the League of Nations today voted to ask the League council "in principle" to return the Saar basin territory to Germany. At Saarbrücken the Nazis assumed full command of the police force.

Petition of Electors Who Alleged Default Is Granted by Court

Order Issued in Supreme Court Today by Mr. Justice D. A. McDonald—Municipality Has Been Having Difficulty in Financing Owing to Relief
VANCOUVER, Jan. 15: (CP)—Appointment of a commissioner for the City of Fernie by the government under the Municipal Act was ordered today by Mr. Justice D. A. McDonald in Supreme Court on application of four electors who alleged default by the city on 1934 interest coupons. Fernie has been having difficulty in financing for some time, supposedly on account of the heavy burden of relief it has been carrying owing to curtailment of employment in the coal fields.

Information Being Awaited Regarding Dock Employment

Another meeting of dry dock workers was held last night at the Canadian Legion rooms to discuss the present employment situation at the local shipyard on overhauling of the steamer Prince Rupert but, as no further information is available as yet, no action was taken. A number of inquiries have been made but no answers have yet been given by the authorities concerned. A number of organizations are cooperating.

Four Million Tons of New Fuel Annually is Started Moving Today

Youthful King of Iraq Presses Button Which Opens 1150-Mile Pipe Line, Longest in World and Costing \$50,000,000
KIRKUK, Iraq, Jan. 15: (CP)—A great stream of oil estimated at four million tons annually from the desert reservoirs of Asia Minor was started on its way to the world markets today by the youthful King Gazi of Iraq who pressed a button opening an 1150-mile pipe line, the longest in existence and costing \$50,000,000. The line reaches the sea at Haifa from the rich Mosul fields.

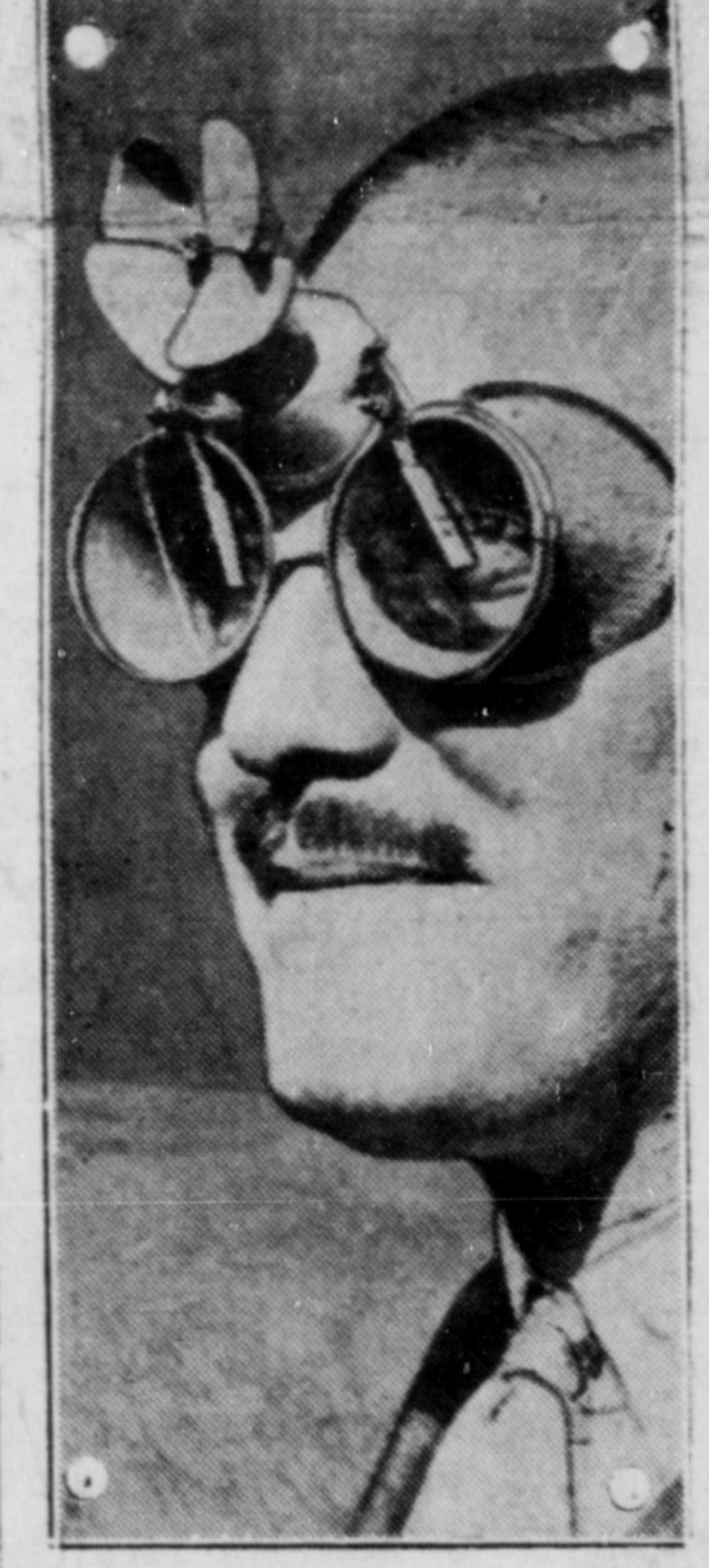
Several Acclamations Recorded in Various Cities of the Province Yesterday

FRESH HOPE NOW FOR SETTLEMENT OF CHACO FIGHT

GENEVA, Jan. 15:—New hope has arisen for an ending of the Gran Chaco warfare between Paraguay and Bolivia following notification of the League by Paraguay that she is willing to agree to League of Nations arbitration of the dispute with a peace parley as proposed at Buenos Aires. Paraguay has been the aggressor and victor in most of the recent fighting. Bolivia had previously signified willingness to arbitrate.
