

Slave Lake Tempest Causes Much Damage To Land and Railway

Crops Over Area of Quarter of Million Acres Ruined And Livestock Will Have to be Sacrificed on Account Of Almost Certain Fodder Shortage

EDMONTON, June 27: (CP)—The Northern Alberta Railway line west of Slave Lake town is a mass of twisted steel and driftwood following devastation caused by the most serious floods in the history of Lesser Slave Lake. Once prosperous farms on 250,000 acres of Slave Lake lowlands are represented by storm-wrecked buildings
