House of Commons. The report, it is understood, will recommend the establishmetn of a board to supervise the fisheries industry which will be brought under the Natural Products Marketing Act. Establishment of boards to regulate several other industries will also be recommended.

A central body, to be known as the Federal Trade Commission, will have authority to deal with unfair or unethical practices.

Special measures to control combines are recommended as well as to curb fraudulent advertising.

Legislation based on the commission's recommendations will ment after the adjournment.



## Cambridge Defeats Oxford For Twelfth Straight Time In Historic Boat Classic

PUTNEY, England, April 6: (CP)-For the twelfth consecutive year, Cambridge defeated Oxford in the classic varsity boat race today by four and one-half lengths, giving the Cantabs forty-six wins to date to forty for Oxford in addition to one dead heat since the inauguration of the race.

Weather conditions were good except for an early wind which roughened the water.

Cambridge led all the way. The time was nineteen minutes and forty-eight seconds against the record set by Cambridge last year of eighteen minutes and three seconds.
