WRONG IS NEVER RIGHT

There is a big fight on in Ontario in regard to the cancelling of power contracts by the provincial government with a number of power companies. It is said by the representatives of the province that they are not only wrong morally but also legally.

There is a difference of opinion as to what contracts, if any, may be annulled. Some claim that a contract is something sacred and whether bad or good should be carried out to the letter. The other opinion is that no contract is binding which is unjust—that if a contract is wrong, the signing of it did not make it right. It would be a worse wrong to continue an unjust contract than to break it. There are many things more sacred than a solemn contract.

1,000 ROSES HAVE ARRIVED

MAROONS IN NEAR CINCH

Defeated Maple Leafs Saturday To Take Strangle-Hold on Stanley Cup

Wide Open Game

Montreal's Made Great Display of Defensive Tactics After Piling Up Heavy Lead

TORONTO, April 8: (CP)—Before a crowd of 14,000 fans in the Maple Leaf Gardens Saturday night, the Montreal Maroons took a strangle-hold on the Stanley Cup series by outplaying and outclassing the Toronto Maple Leafs to win by a score of three to one in a fast, wide open game. The Maroons having won here the first two of the best three out of five game series, the scene now changes to Montreal where the third game will be played tomorrow night and the fourth, if necessary, on Thursday. Should the Maple Leafs win the two games in Montreal to tie up the series, the fifth and deciding game would be played in Toronto Saturday night.

The Maroons played a great game Saturday night and were in control of the situation throughout, never permitting the Maple Leafs, who put everything they had into the effort to get into the lead. The Maroons stood off a fierce Toronto attack in the first period, held the Leafs in the second and took complete command in the third, checking the Leafs into submission. After building up their commanding lead, the Maroons almost throughout the last period engaged in defensive tactics. On several occasions, the Maple Leafs, concentrating almost their entire strength on the forward line, sieged the Maroons goal but found the Montreal defence, in which Hooley Smith starred, impenetrable.

Robinson opened the scoring for the Maroons in the first period and, about half way through the second, Harvey Jackson, netted the equalizer for the Maple Leafs. With three minutes of the second period to go, Blinco put the Maroons into the lead with a brilliant score from an awkward corner on an assist from Shields. Four minutes after the start of the third period, Wentworth and "Baldy" Northcott dashed away with the puck out of one Toronto's fierce attacks and the latter made the third Montreal goal. Thereafter, the Maroons engaged exclusively in a close-checking defensive game and held the fierce-attacking Maple Leafs at Bay.

Gonnell, in the Maroon goal, had to stop twenty-one shots in the first period and forty-four in the entire game while Hainsworth of the Maple Leafs handled only seventeen.

CAMERON IN LEAD

Establishes Commanding Margin Over Don Brown in Billiard Semi-Final

The first block of the second semi-final of the city billiard championship last evening resulted in Neil Cameron establishing a commanding lead of 128 over Don Brown, the scores being: Cameron, 519; Brown, 391.

The game was disappointing, both players being timid in their shots and missing many an easy set-up. Cannons were missed by a hair's breadth, balls juggled around the pockets and then stayed out. And, although Don, in turn, implored and threatened the Gods of billiards, he failed to get any consideration from them.

Cameron's best break was 45 (losing the white at 30), 31, 23, 21 (twice). Brown could not get going, his best being 33, 24, 22, 21.

The second block will be played tonight. The finals, originally scheduled for Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of this week, have been postponed till Sunday, Monday and Tuesday of next week. In the final, which will be of three blocks, C. P. Balagno, the present city champion, will meet the winner of tonight's game.

The handsome trophy is now on view in John Bulger Limited's window and very favorable comment is heard.
