# NEW DEMANDS ARE MADE BY HITLER

# NO CHANGE IN HALIBUT FISHING SITUATION ON COAST YET

The Fate of the World Lies in the Hands of These British and European Statesmen



Top row, left to right: Anthony Eden, Lord Privy Seal, England, who, along with Sir John Simon, has held a conference with Adolph Hitler, (centre). Next to Michael Kalin, president of the all-Russian council, spokesman for the Soviet government who has lashed out at "capitalist" countries. Extreme right is Hermann Goering who is head of Germany's air force, now a vital factor in the arms disputes. He is also a power in German affairs, and Hitler's right hand man. Lower row: Premier Pierre Flandin, of France, who along with Pierre Laval, foreign minister, drew up a strong protest to send to Germany. Next is the familiar figure of Mussolini whose attention is directed both in Abyssinia where troops are massing, and to Europe where the same thing is happening. Next to Il Duce comes Joseph Gobbells, German minister of propoganda, who is responsible for defending Germany's stand. In the circle is Chancellor Schuschnigg, of Austria, who, it is reported, favors Germany's action and may follow suit in denouncing Versailles treaty. Extreme right is Maxim Litvinoff, Soviet foreign minister and dubbed Europe's cleverest statesman who seeks all-Europe alliance for peace.

Bennett Government Indicted By Col. J. L. Ralston, Chief Liberal Financial Critic

OTTAWA, March 27: (CP)-A challenge to close Parliament and bring on a general election immediately was hurled across the floor of the House of Commons yesterday by Hon. J. L. Ralston, Liberal financial critic, in concluding his speech in reply to the budget.

The former minister of national defence climaxed a manysided indictment of the government by moving a want of confidence motion reading that "this House regrets that the proposals submitted by the minister of finance are entirely inadequate to meet the serious and acute situation prevailing in Canada and offer an additional reason why an appeal to the people should no longer be delayed."

The debate is continuing.
