

Could it be mere political opposition because "we succeeded where they failed?" The fact was these agreements had saved the industries of Canada from ruin. What did the Pacific slope think of them? What did the Maritimes think? What about Eastern Quebec? All agreed that they had been of the utmost benefit.

Country Recovering

Mr. Bennett said with a degree of pride that the country was! emerging from the depression, that lit was on the upward grade, that it had maintained the integrity of its financial structure, that it had met every one of its obligations on the terms of its contracts. The task was by no means completed but the country had gone forward and was in the forefront in emerging from the depression. Measures of recovery had been passed but they were not sufficient as yet.

Having passed through the crisis and being appreciative of the difficulties, he was fully convinced of the necessity for reform, declared the Premier. The government was resolved to pass legislation to rectify the situation and remedy the causes, to ensure that the patient now well on the road to recovery should not have a recurrence.

"The capitalistic system has ser-ved us well," asserted the Premier, ELKS WIN "but it must be overhauled. We recognize that great and powerful interests will be opposed to changes.
