FINE TIME AT BABINE

Harry McLeod Had Fine Angling—Big Bull Moose and Black Bear Shot—Tame Deer

H. F. McLeod returned to the city on Saturday night's train after spending a highly enjoyable outing of a month and a half at Babine Lake Hatchery, the main objective of the trip being angling of which he was able to enjoy a great deal of the very finest.

Mr. MacLeod reports wild life in abundance around Babine. A few days after he got there, a big bull moose was shot just back of the hatchery and this provided fresh meat for a good time. A few days ago a big black bear was shot.

Another interesting thing at the hatchery is a tame doe, now two years old, which is not kept in captivity but which makes its headquarters at the hatchery, coming from the hills every few days to all on her friends there. She comes right into the dwellings. When Mr. MacLeod was being brought out, the animal insisted on following the boat and had to be driven back.

Winter weather conditions are starting to close in at Babine Lake. There has already been a flurry of snow although it did not stay on the ground. There has been ten degrees of frost and ice is beginning to form on the lake shore.

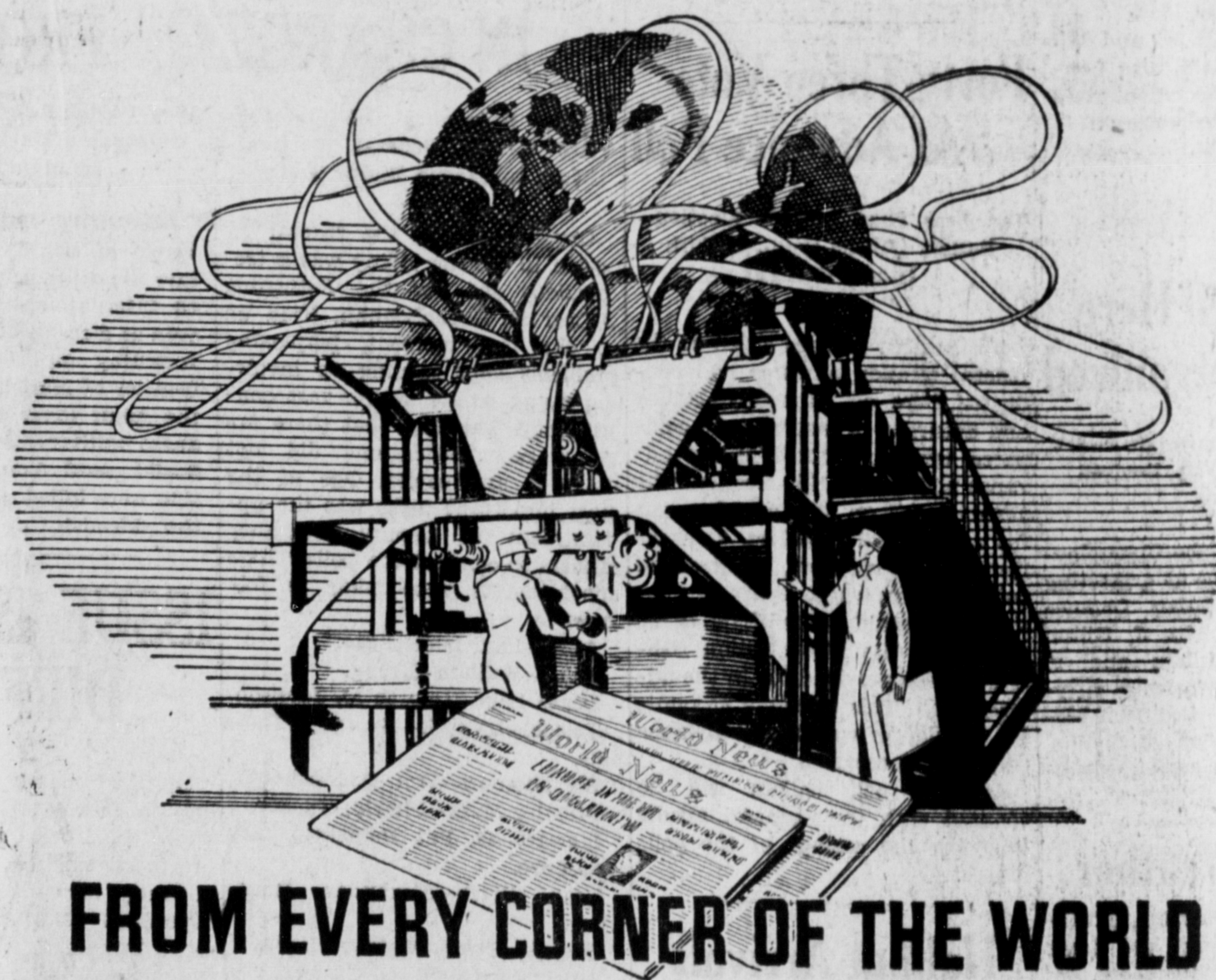
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
