British Go After More India Trade

Party of Fifty Business Men Will Make Tour of Markets in East

LONDON, Oct. 31: (CP)—British business men's first organized tour of India, Burma and Ceylon will leave England November 9.

Expected to number fifty or more the party will spend more than two months' travelling through the country in a train placed at their disposal by the Indian railway authorities.

Every opportunity is being afforded to study the possibilities both of extending the market for British goods and of increasing the purchase by Britain, of the products of Indian and Ceylon industries.

Organized by the Association of Indian Municipalities, of which the Aga Khan is patron and the Gaekwar of Baroda president-elect, the party will visit 27 towns in India, Burma and Ceylon. Civic receptions are being arranged in many of the centres, while the Gaekwar of Baroda, who is celebrating his jubilee this year, is making special preparations for the entertainment of the travellers.

Timely Recipes

FISH "LEFTOVERS"

Fish left overs can be used in several ways. For instance, portions remaining uneaten from baked, steamed or boiled fish may be made into a creamed or scalloped dish or into a soufflé. But they may also be turned to account in another way and that is by using them in making a quick fish soup.

Such a soup is not only quickly prepared but all that is required in making it is the fish, some milk and perhaps additional seasonings. How to make it was outlined by Mrs. Evelyne Spencer, formerly cookery expert of the Dominion Department of Fisheries. Place the left-over fish in a saucepan, she said, and add to it enough milk to produce the quantity of soup required. (If canned milk is used it should be diluted.) While the fish and milk are heating they should be blended well together by stirring. Thickening is not necessary if the left-overs are from a dish in which there was white sauce; otherwise, it may be needed. What measure of seasoning will be required will depend largely upon the amount of seasoning used when the fish was first cooked. One way to give more flavor is to blend a teaspoon of curry powder with cold water and add it to the soup, whisking it in thoroughly.

Lakelse Lake Gets Best Run In Four Years

Observations by employees of the Dominion Department of Fisheries this year indicated that the run of parent sockeye salmon to the Lakelse Lake spawning area in British Columbia was the largest since 1931. The Lakelse area is one of the important sockeye spawning districts of the Pacific Coast.

Sockeye egg collections at the Lakelse hatchery, operated by the Dominion department, totalled 8,259,000, approximately 4,280 fish being handled by the hatchery people in securing the eggs and obtaining fertilization. The egg total was greater by more than a quarter of a million than it had been last year, roughly 1,900,000 above the 1933 total, and about 2,400,000 larger than in 1932. It was only about 61,000 smaller than the sockeye egg collection in 1931.
