In Cariboo, J. G. Turgeon, Liberal, has a lead of five hundred with seventy small polls to hear from and his election seems almost certain although the C. C. F. still has a faint hope that the Peace River farm vote may give enough support to John McInnis to elect

In Vancouver-Burrard both Arnold Webster, C. C. F., and Mayor G. G. McGeer, Liberal claim to be elected but the count so far shows the former to be leading by ninety and the situation will likely remain unchanged until the official count on October 25. McGeer pins his hopes on the possibility of a mistake having been made in the counting. He had been at first believed elected.

The result in West York, Ont., was reversed last night when the riding tottered back into the Liberal column. The Conservative candidate, Peter L. Brown, had been previously announced as winner by a majority of twelve but J. E. L. Streight, Liberal, is now declared elected by a nice majority. In the 1930 election this seat was won by Hon. J. Earl Lawson with a majority of 9475. Mr. Lawson was elecited in this election in South York.



League May Use Huge British Fleet Stationed in Mediterranean



This map shows how Britain's warships menace Italy's fleet in the Mediterranean. Notice how the Red Sea and the Suez Canal are guarded. The possibility of Britain's fleet being used in applying the sanctions voted by the League of Nations is voiced in many quarters although there is also considerable opposition to such a move and France is suggesting that the fleet be withdrawn.
