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## MR. DUNCAN ROSS ARRIVED IN THE CITY TODAY

### PEOPLE'S FIGHT AGAINST THE PROTECTED INTERESTS

Mr. Duncan Ross Explains Why Political Distinctions Are Dropped in Present Campaign—Sir Wilfrid Laurier's Policy to Build up City he Created

When Mr. Duncan Ross arrived at the campaign committee rooms this morning the crowd insisted on occupying chairs and calling for a speech from the candidate. At the call of the chairman, Mr. A. J. Morris, they gave another three rousing cheers and a tiger for Mr. Ross. Hats and hands were waved in the enthusiasm. Then the candidate spoke.

**Consumer vs. Interests**  
"The skill of the pipes and the enthusiasm of this impromptu demonstration arouses my Scottish blood," he said. "But I must not make a speech now. I must wait until tonight. I want to tell you that this campaign so far has proved to me that the present fight is not between the political parties, but is between the consumers and the protected interests."

**Consumers are Solid**  
"In the mining districts and lumber camps I visited down south, all consumers, they are solid for reciprocity. If I can have the consumers with me in this fight I am satisfied. The other

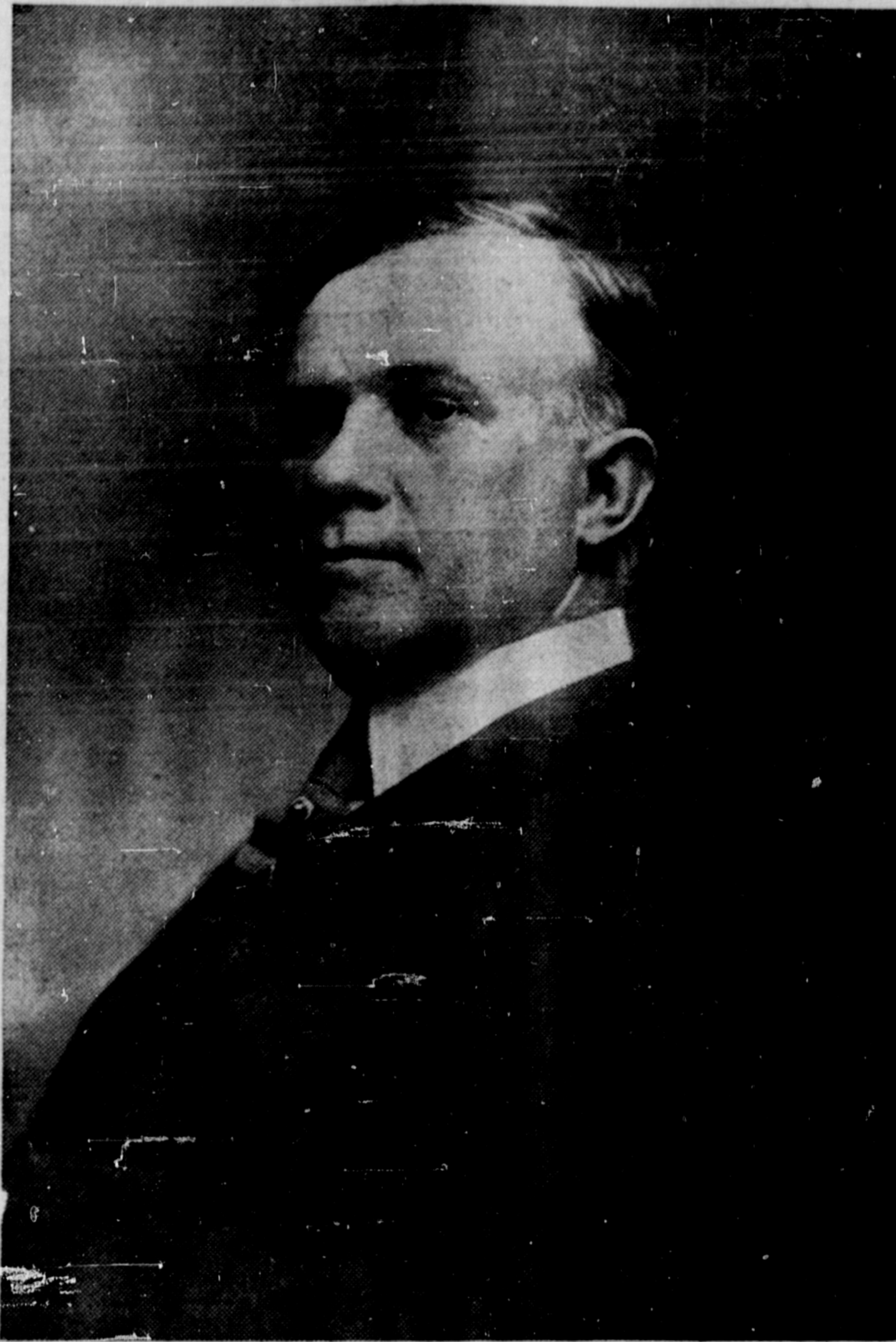
fellow is welcome to the support of the protected interests.

**Message to Rupert**

"This is a contest of peculiar importance to Prince Rupert. Prince Rupert is practically the creation of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Sir Wilfrid has not been content to merely make Prince Rupert possible. He has initiated a policy which will make it a great city. Reciprocity is a policy which will not only reduce the cost of living to the people of Prince Rupert. It will develop the whole of this great northern district of Comox-Atlin, and make Prince Rupert prosperous."

### REAL HIGHLAND WELCOME GIVEN TO DUNCAN ROSS

Tartan Piper Headed the Demonstration to the Reciprocity Candidate on the Wharf This Morning—Triumphal Procession Through the Town

By the rousing strains of the Highland bagpipes Mr. Duncan Ross strode across the gangway of the Prince George this morning, a strong candidate with a strong straight cause. On the wharf to greet him thronged a group of his leading supporters crowding eagerly forward with the warmest of welcomes. Behind them again beyond the reserved space at the landing berth gathered others by scores, and the instant Mr. Ross set foot on the wharf up went a rousing burst of cheering.

**"Ross Right for Rupert"**

"Three cheers for Duncan Ross—Hip, Hip, Hurrah!" The shout resounded along the whole waterfront. Again and again rang out the welcome. The pipes skirled their loyal fighting strains. The tartan waved a welcome with the Union Jack. "Ross and Reciprocity for Rupert!" Some one sent up the great shout again, and catching the cry the crowd ripped out another swift crashing trio of cheers. In the midst of the welcoming thunder about him Mr.

Ross was shaking hands with his supporters lining up to march to the Liberal headquarters.

**"Cead Mille Failte"**

Up Centre street they marched with the hero of the hour, and the piper led the way with the battling cry of "Ross and Reciprocity for Rupert" boldly lettered on the banner in the midst.

At the Liberal Committee Rooms a second great welcome awaited the candidate. Here as the strains of the pipes ceased one caught the familiar accents of the Gaelic giving to Duncan Ross the "Cead Mille Failte" which means "A Hundred Thousand Welcomes," from his Scottish friends in Prince Rupert. And Mr. Ross's reply showed that the kindly Highland talk has not failed his tongue after his years in Western Canada.

Reciprocity is consonant with the highest conceptions of Great Britain's fiscal aspirations and will help make Canada great as the Motherland is great.

### UNDER PRESSURE, VOTERS ARE ADMITTED

As a result of the agitation by the Daily News against the proposed disfranchising of hundreds of Prince Rupert property owners, the City Hall officials last night acting under revised orders, made out an extra list of 299 property owners who will be allowed to vote today.

Many of these are persons whose vote had been refused earlier in the week. All citizens whose vote has been refused—whether for or against the by-laws—should apply again to the returning officer at the Police Station.

### \$20,000 OFFICE BLOCK FOR SECOND AVE.

Second avenue is to have another fine set of office buildings and residential rooms to cost from \$15,000 to \$20,000. The buildings are to be erected on lots near the offices of S. Harrison & Co., realty agents, who have just sold them to Mr. Charles Gore of the firm of Bevan, Gore & Elliott, stock brokers, Vancouver and Victoria.

Some other property on the neighborhood of Hays Creek has also been transferred to the same owner who will develop this as soon as evidences of substantial progress begin to become apparent on the dry dock works now under survey. Mr. Gore is arranging at present for plans for his new buildings which will add considerably to the appearance of Second avenue in the business section.

It is probable that on the Hays property Mr. Gore may erect an apartment house of considerable size to accommodate labor for the new dry dock. Progress on the dry dock development work according to the latest report of Mr. Pillsbury the engineer in charge of the work at present is good, and substantial advances may be expected in all directions before long.

### NO PARTY HAS MONOPOLY OF BRITISH LOYALTY

Conservatives of Canada Ape Position Arrogated by House of Lords as Custodians of Integrity of British Empire—Stirring Address of Ex-Mayor Fred Stork

The Liberal committee rooms were pecked last night, many being unable to obtain admittance. Alex. Manson presided over a most enjoyable smoker and Howard Campbell who hails from Nova Scotia, made some telling points as to the benefits the fishing industry of that province and of Prince Rupert would receive by the adoption of the reciprocity pact.

But the most interesting talk of the evening was that by ex-Mayor Stork, so recently returned from Europe. In the course of his remarks he said: "The position of the Tory party in England and in Canada are identical. The members of the House of Lords in England regard themselves as being the custodians of British loyalty, and they strongly resented and opposed the trespass on their rights, as such, in the passage of the veto bill. This was eventually carried by the Liberal party and it is regarded as being one of the greatest victories for the common people that has ever been attained in

Britain without the shedding of blood. "The Peers opposed the measure on the ground that they were protecting the integrity of the British Empire in so doing. In Canada, strange to say, the very same argument is being used in opposition to reciprocity.

"Reciprocity, a Liberal measure introduced for the benefit of the common people of Canada, is being bitterly opposed by the manufacturing and moneyed classes, who claim that the development of trade with the United States is bound to weaken our ties with the Mother country and ultimately lead to the annexation of Canada to the United States. In this way the Tory party of Canada, as the House of Lords in England, is seeking to arrogate to itself the position of custodian of British loyalty.

"No class, no party, no clique rich or poor in Great Britain or Canada, or in any portion of the British Empire, has or can have any monopoly of sturdy British loyalty."
