POLITICS AND BUSINESS

Prince Rupert is a Liberal city brought into being by a Liberal government and almost killed on more than one occasion by the Conservative party getting into power at the crucial time.

Once again we have a crucial time in the history of this city. A new industry is about to be established here. While we recognize the fact that the present federal government turned over the dry dock site to the new company for a consideration, we also know that under a Liberal government which is really interested in the progress of the city and port there is more likely to be real progress. The whole country is going Liberal and under such circumstances it would be the reasonable thing from a business point of view for Prince Rupert to send a Liberal to Ottawa.

A Vancouver newspaper recently in an editorial article said: "The Conservatives conserve, the radicals protest and destroy, the Socialists talk and preach but the Liberals are the go-getters who go out and create business." There has usually been prosperity in Canada under Liberal governments and it seems reasonable to expect that this will be the case during the next few years.

Speaking of what the political parties did in England the same newspaper says: "The Liberals built Britain with shops and trade. The Tories drank tea, shot pheasants and hobbled with royalty. The Socialists aired their Marxian theories in Hyde Park." There may be a time and place for each of them but what we need in Prince Rupert today is a party that will help build the city with industries, trade and commerce, making everybody busy and prosperous.

When we get too busy we shall need the Conservative party to come to the rescue and hold us down, but at present the one thing needful in this city is Liberalism and business and then more business. The program of the C. C. F. is a program of talk. Have they done anything at Victoria? They admit they have not. Who are the C. C. F. leaders here? Have they ever done anything for themselves or for anyone else? The Liberals are led by a man who has shown his ability to do things both for himself and for the community in which he has lived. If we return him to Parliament again with a Liberal government there he will have an opportunity to serve us as we have never been served before.
