SILVER PRICE IS STILL ADVANCING

TWO MORE HEADS LOPPED OFF IN GERMANY THIS MORNING

United States Gov't. Makes Ready to Meet Jump in White Metal

Secretary of Treasury Morgenthau Says Government Price Will Keep Pace With World Quotation—Another Increase Recorded Today

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 10: (CP)—If world silver prices advance above 64 1/2c per ounce now paid by the federal government for the newly-mined metal, the government will be ready to meet the advance, Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau stated today. In New York today commercial bar silver jumped 1 1/2c to 64 1/2c per ounce.

GRAIN SHIP IS IN PORT

Jersey City Arrives From Orient And Will Load Full Cargo For U. K. Continent

The Beardon, Smith freighter Jersey City arrived in port at 9:30 o'clock this morning from the Orient and went on berth immediately at the Alberta Wheat Pool's local elevator to load a full cargo of grain for the United Kingdom or Continent. It is expected she will sail about the end of the week, being already engaged in loading.

The Jersey City, which had an uneventful voyage across the Pacific Ocean, was met at Triple Island by Capt. Joseph Flood who piloted her into the harbor. The Armour Salvage Co.'s service boat Pachena, Capt. Oscar Haveroy, was used as pilot's tender.

Capt. L. Sterling is master of the Jersey City.

The Jersey City came here from Osaka, Japan, which port she left on March 22. The vessel, registered from Bideford, England, is of 3937 tons register and has a crew of 38 men.

New York Stock Mart Cheerful

Industrials Led in General Upward Trend in Yesterday's Trading

NEW YORK, April 10:—The stock market had a distinctly more cheerful tone yesterday, industrials leading in a general upward trend. The day's turnover amounted to 800,000 shares with closing averages as follows: Industrials, 104.32, up 1.67; rails 30.06, up .94; utilities, 17.84, up .23, and bonds, 94.46, up .03.

France and Soviet Russia To Sign Up New Accord Soon

PARIS, April 10: (CP)—France and Soviet Russia will sign a new security accord, it was announced yesterday afternoon by Foreign Minister Pierre Laval of France. A new commercial pact between Russia and Germany was also reported yesterday.

RAILWAY POOLING

Little Progress Has So Far Been Made, Declares Chairman Of Canadian National

OTTAWA, April 10: (CP)—Hon. C. P. Fullerton, chairman of the board of trustees of the Canadian National Railways, told the House of Commons railway committee yesterday that pooling arrangements between the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific Railways "were satisfactory in a way." However, generally speaking, "very little has been accomplished."

In 1933, Judge Fullerton said, a saving of \$1,000,000 had been effected but last year the saving was only about \$400,000.

STILL HOPE FOR PEACE

Germany Has Not Yet Rejected Central European Security Pact

LONDON, April 10:—Revealing some of the events which had transpired at the recent conference in Berlin with Reichsfuehrer Adolf Hitler, Sir John Simon, British foreign secretary, told the House of Commons yesterday that Germany had not as yet definitely rejected a central European security pact.

ONTARIO FILIBUSTER ENDS WITH PASSAGE OF CANCELLING BILL

TORONTO, April 10: (CP)—A filibuster of record duration which kept the Legislature in continuous session for thirty-seven hours ended at 4 o'clock this morning with the defeat of an amendment by the opposition to give a six months' hoist to the government's bill cancelling contracts with four Quebec power companies. The main bill was then immediately passed through committee stage.

FIRST FISH SOLD TODAY

Melville and Takla Bring Catches Totalling 43,000 Pounds, Receiving 11c and 7c

First fresh halibut of the season was sold on the local Fish Exchange this morning, 11c and 8c being paid for catches totalling 43,000 pounds.

The boats selling were the Melville, Capt. John Ivarson, 21,000 pounds, and Takla, Capt. Chris Parkvold, 22,000 pounds.

They took their catches in four days' fishing. The purchasers were the Pacific Fisheries and Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co.

POUND IN MONTREAL

MONTREAL, April 10: (CP)—The British pound sterling closed at \$4.86 1/2 on the local exchange market yesterday.

NAVY BILL IS PASSED

Thirty-Eight Million Dollars Made Available For Defences—Only Congress Can Conscript

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 10:—The House yesterday approved the \$38,000,000 naval appropriations bill which includes \$10,000,000 for the Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, naval base, where a huge dry dock is to be constructed.

The House refused to give the President authority to raise an army by conscription, holding that only Congress should have that authority.

Trailed Spies During War

Henry Fitch, Noted Scotland Yard Detective, Dies—Was Bodyguard To King Edward

LONDON, April 10:—Henry Fitch, noted Scotland Yard detective, who was personal bodyguard to the late King Edward VII and who attained considerable prominence during the Great War on account of his activities in trailing German spies, died yesterday.

WHEAT PRICES

WINNIPEG, April 10: (CP)—Wheat prices were 1/2c higher on the local market yesterday. In Chicago they were slightly weaker.

Official Executioner Carries Out His Grim Task With Formality

Jew and Aryan Go to Block Today For Slaying of High Nazi Official Five Years Ago

BERLIN, April 10: (CP)—Once more Germany's official executioner donned his top hat, kid gloves and tail coat and the same medieval battle axe which fell on the necks of two noblewomen spies six weeks ago was used this morning to lop off the heads of two men accused of "crimes of political hatred." Sally Eppstein, a 26-year old Jew, and Hans Ziegler, a 34-year old Aryan, went to the block for the slaying of a high Nazi official five years ago.

BUSINESS SECTION OF PRAIRIE TOWN IS LOST IN FIRE

SASKATOON, April 10: (CP)—The entire business section of the town of Herschel, including the post office, Royal Bank of Canada and eight other structures, was destroyed by fire yesterday. The blaze, before being brought under control, threatened some residences.

KETCHIKAN BOATS OUT

Some Difference of Opinion Arises Over Effectiveness of Curtailment Plan

KETCHIKAN, April 10: (CP)—Some twenty-seven halibut boats have left here for the fishing banks since Monday, the large majority having got away yesterday.

Some dissension over the curtailment plan proposed by the boat owners has been shown during the past few days with the minority group which went out yesterday believing the plan would not be effective.

INTERIOR BURGLARY

Imperial Oil Co. Office Visited—Safe Opened and Money And Papers Taken

Over the last week-end the office of the Imperial Oil Co. at Prince George was broken into and the safe opened, \$165 in cash being taken as well as a typewriter, two old coins, a check for \$8 and life insurance papers, birth certificate, Masonic documents and personal letters belonging to one of the employees. According to word received at divisional headquarters of the provincial police here, there is no clue yet as to the identity of the burglar.

Investigating Halibut Under Marketing Act

W. F. Chown, official of the Department of Trade and Commerce from Ottawa, arrived in Prince Rupert this morning in the course of a trip to the Pacific Coast to investigate the advisability of including halibut under the Natural Products Marketing Act. Halibut boat owners of Prince Rupert recently requested that halibut be so included. There is some opposition to the move at Vancouver.

STRIKERS IN JAIL

Relief Camp Men Incarcerated At Nelson After Being Taken Off Train

NELSON, April 10: (CP)—Sixty-four relief camp strikers were escorted to jail here before midnight last night after having been taken from a freight train at Coquendahl, a station on the Kettle Valley Railway about forty miles west of here.

Fearful of Being Assassinated, To Live in England

ROME, April 10:—Former Premier Elphtherios Venizelos of Greece, who has been living in exile on the Island of Rhodes since the recent revolution in Greece, will make his future home in England, it is expected. He is said, according to reports reaching here, to be fearful of assassination.

Flood Danger Is Near End

Accidental Death Verdicts Returned In Connection With California Railway Fatalities

ROSEVILLE, Cal., April 10: (CP)—Verdicts of accidental death were returned by a jury investigating the deaths of eleven section workers on the Union Pacific Railway near here. A car on which they were riding while engaged in repairing damage to the tracks resulting from heavy rains of the last few days was struck by a work train.

Weather was clearing yesterday and flood waters were receding with the danger of further inundations apparently over.

Canadian Legion Hall at Salmon Arm is Damaged

SALMON ARM, April 10:—The Canadian Legion building here was seriously damaged by fire yesterday afternoon.
