JAPAN HAVING SLEEPING SICKNESS

ABERHART EXPECTED TO ASSUME PREMIERSHIP OF ALTA.

Nearly Three Hundred Are Dead From Strange Malady; Many More Ill

Disease Is Particularly Prevalent in Osaka, Kobe and Okayama Districts With Few Cases Also Reported In City of Tokio

TOKYO, August 24 (Canadian Press)—The death toll of an epidemic of sleeping sickness in Japan has reached 275 up to today. The malady is particularly prevalent in the central provinces and is baffling medical authorities. Five hundred more cases are reported, chiefly in Osaka, Kobe and Okayama districts. There are a few cases in Tokio.

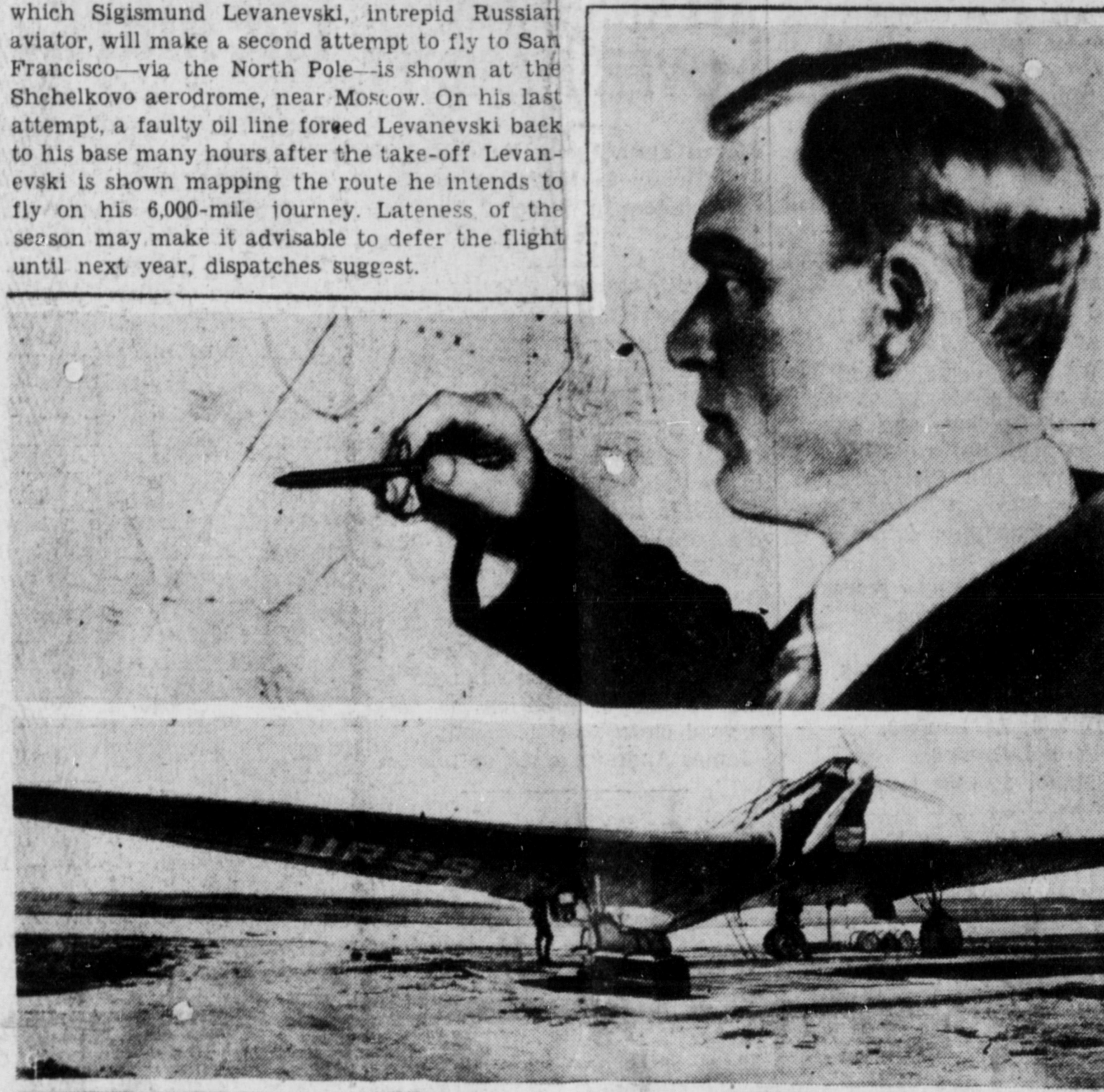

Soviet Fliers to Re-attempt Flight Over Pole

The giant Soviet aeroplane, USSR No. 25, in which Sigmund Levanovski, intrepid Russian aviator, will make a second attempt to fly to San Francisco—via the North Pole—is shown at the Shehelkovo aerodrome, near Moscow. On his last attempt, a faulty oil line forced Levanovski back to his base many hours after the take-off. Levanovski is shown mapping the route he intends to fly on his 6,000-mile journey. Lateness of the season may make it advisable to defer the flight until next year, dispatches suggest.



Social Creditors Will Have Total of Fifty Six Members Likely

Not One of Successful Candidates of New Party Has Had Previous Legislative Experiences—United Farmer Government Faces Possibility of Complete Annihilation

OTTAWA, August 24 (Canadian Press)—Constitutional authorities declared today that William Aberhart, Calgary High School principal, evangelist and leader of the Social Credit party in Alberta, could immediately form a government in that province and become Premier without the necessity of a by-election but, in order to lead the Legislature, must secure a seat for himself.

CALGARY, August 24 (Canadian Press)—Continuing to pile up a majority as the returns near completion, Social Credit had definitely elected forty-seven members up to this afternoon as a result of Thursday's provincial election and was leading in nine seats, leaving a possibly seven seats for Liberals, United Farmers of Alberta and Conservatives.

Four Liberals, including W. R. Howson and G. H. Van Allen K.C. in Edmonton and John J. Bowlen in Calgary, have so far been definitely elected.

John Irwin, Conservative, was elected in Calgary, and D. M. Duggan, Conservative leader, in Edmonton, later returns showing that Irwin would replace J. W. Huggill K.C., Social Credit, giving Calgary city four Social Credit members, one Liberal and one Conservative.

Liberal Candidate, L. A. Giroux, is leading in Grouard. At the end of the twenty-second count in Edmonton, only four successful candidates had been actually decided—W. R. Howson and G. H. Van Allen, Liberals, S. A. G. Barnes, Social Credit, and D. M. Duggan, Conservative. Attorney-General J. H. Lymburn went down in the twenty-second count.

On the basis of latest returns and, subject to further revision, the standing of parties for the 63 seats would appear to be as follows:

- Social Credit, 56.
 - Liberals, 4.
 - Conservatives, 2.
 - United Farmers, 1.
- Not one of the Social Credit candidates so far definitely elected has had legislative experience.

EXECUTES HIMSELF

Estonian Murderer Is Permitted to Take Poison From Own Hand In Expiation of Crime

REVAL, Estonia, August 24:—The first legal self-execution in modern history took place here when a 24-year old laborer, who had been convicted of murder in connection with the assault, rape and killing of a 40-year old school teacher, administered deadly potassium cyanide to himself and, with one gasp, dropped dead. The prisoner, given the choice of poisoning himself or being executed, took the drug without hesitation. The alternative of self-execution has now been legalized in Estonia.

Great Seaplane Returning Home

Pan American Clipper Expected to Make Hop From Honolulu and Alameda Today

HONOLULU, August 24:—The great flying boat Pan American Clipper, on the way home after a flight as far west as the remote Wake Island, is expected to leave here today for Alameda. The ship arrived here Thursday evening after a ten hour flight from Midway Islands, a distance of 1400 miles.
