ROME, June 17: (CP)-Italy went on a semi-war basis today when nearly a million men were called to arms and her silver partly nationalized as Premier Mussolini held up the grandeurs of Rome as the standard of the country.

The pace of departures for East Africa of troops and war materials was speeded up while the Italo-Ethiopian arbitration commission prepared to meet again. Italian official circles expressed the belief that the commission would be unable to settle the border dispute between the two countries by peaceful methods.
