WHAT IT MEANS

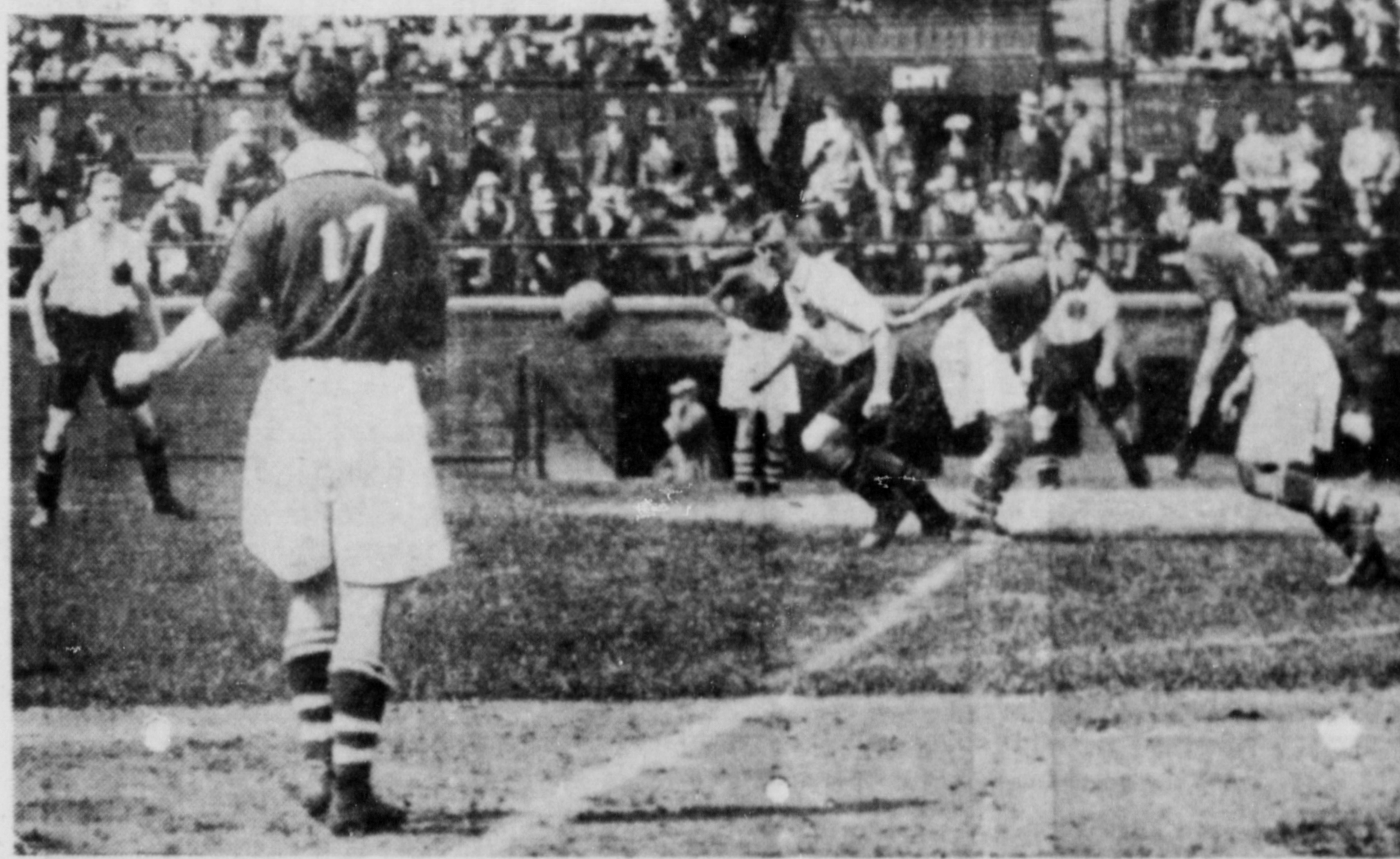
Some people have inquired what is meant by the lawsuit settled finally by the Privy Council in England this week between the C. N. R. and the C. P. R. When the two big railways decided to purchase jointly the Northern Alberta Railways it was decided to share all export freight business going to competitive ports. The C. N. R. interpreted this to mean that they would get a half share of all grain going to Fort William and also all going to Vancouver. The C. P. R. argued that Prince Rupert and Victoria were competitive points with Vancouver and so all grain hauled by the C. N. R. to Prince Rupert should count as part of the share of the national line. The Railway Board supported the C. N. R. but this decision was reversed by the Supreme Court of Canada and from now on any grain shipped through Prince Rupert or Victoria will count as part of the half share of the National Railways in the output of the Peace River country over their railways.

A CONTINUOUS FIGHT

Many people will remember Premier McBride going to Ottawa and demanding better terms from the government of Canada in regard to subsidies, freight rates and other matters. He got very little. Later the Oliver government put up a fight on the freight rate question and G. G. McGeer was engaged as counsel to fight the case. British Columbia won and it became possible to ship grain through western ports for export. When the Pattullo government came into power a year and a half ago an economic council was appointed and they investigated the relations between this province and the Dominion and found that British Columbia still had much the worst of the deal. Owing to the depression the situation became acute and several delegations went to Ottawa to try to get better terms or in other words more money. They met with little success. It is possible that no further action will be taken until after the election when a further conference will be held at Ottawa with a view to giving British Columbia a better break. In the meantime the economic situation is becoming more acute owing to the march of two thousand men toward Ottawa as far as Regina. Evidently Premier Bennett has at last discovered that the west has a real grievance. Yesterday it looked as if the valiant Prime Minister was developing a case of jitters. The prophecy of Premier Pattullo that circumstances over which Mr. Bennett had no control would force his hand before long is already coming true. What the men need and must have soon is work and wages. No matter what government is in control at Ottawa, it is the one essential. Idleness breeds all sorts of lawlessness. If the men had been working there would have been no march upon Ottawa.

Scot Football Stars Triumph in North America



An all-star team of Scottish football players picked from the professional teams in the "auld" land have just completed a tour of Canada and United States where they met the best these countries could offer. Stretching their winning streak to ten straight victories, the Scottish team defeated a picked all-star Eastern Canada eleven at Toronto by six goals to nil. Thus they again conquered the east after crossing Canada with a string of triumphs and running into their stiffest opposition against an all-star western Canada team in Vancouver. Scenes from both the east and west games are shown above. Willie Mills, the Aberdeen flash, is shown going into the air (top left) along with Don Cowan, of Vancouver, during stiff tussle on the Pacific coast. Tommy Walker, \$60,000 star of Hearts, is pivoting below waiting to get into action. Scots won that game 1 to 0. Top right shows Scots vs. eastern Canada, with D. Wilson, Scottish forward, being blocked by a smart heading play from a Toronto opponent. Bisley Beckons Empire's Shots For Big Annual

Canadian Team Has Hopes For King's Prize and Report of Last Year's Record

BISLEY CAMP, Eng., June 26; (CP)—The clans are already gathering from all over the Empire for the National Rifle Association's 72nd annual meeting opening July 2 when the Empire's keenest military shots match nerve and experience over all ranges.

Canada's team, which should be one of the strongest the Dominion has ever sent, a formidable combination of brilliancy and experience, hopes not only to match the Dominion's wonderful record last year but to excel it, and possibly again capture the King's Prize, the classic for marksmen. The last occasion for Canada was in 1929 when Lt.-Col. R. M. Blair of Vancouver scored the blue ribbon of Empire marksmanship.

This being the Silver Jubilee year of the King, the Empire meeting over Bisley's far-spreading ranges takes on a new note. The congregation of the military teams from all parts of the Empire in some measure will compensate for the fact that the Empire's fighting services abroad were not represented during the Jubilee celebrations.

The coronation year, 1911, was not one of Canada's great years at Bisley, though they won the Mackinnon Challenge Cup on that occasion. Since then, however, the men from the Dominion have become most prominent of the overseas invaders, and if they can go on where they left off in 1934 it should be a clean sweep for Canada.
