EUROPEAN SECURITY

As a means of preventing war it is possible that no move has yet been made which is as important as the series of conferences on European security initiated by the British government and carried out by Sir John Simon and Capt. Anthony Eden. For the first time the Soviet government has seen the desirability of taking its place as a friendly nation that is willing to co-operate with Great Britain and other powers with a view to bringing about a concordat which is absolutely opposed to war. This is of course aimed at Germany, as that country has shown a disposition to run wild of late. At the same time Germany is asked to join the ring of nations which is determined to prevent war.

With Britain, France, Italy, Russia and Poland united to prevent any other nation overstepping the mark, there is very little likelihood of Germany attempting to embroil the continent in another conflict. She would be circled about with enemies and would have less chance than in the last big war of coming out of the fight victorious. Russia is much stronger than she was in 1914. Italy is much stronger and so is France. Britain will soon recover her position. Germany may seem to be a unit but it is hardly likely the millions of men who were communists only a couple of years ago can now be ardent militarists.

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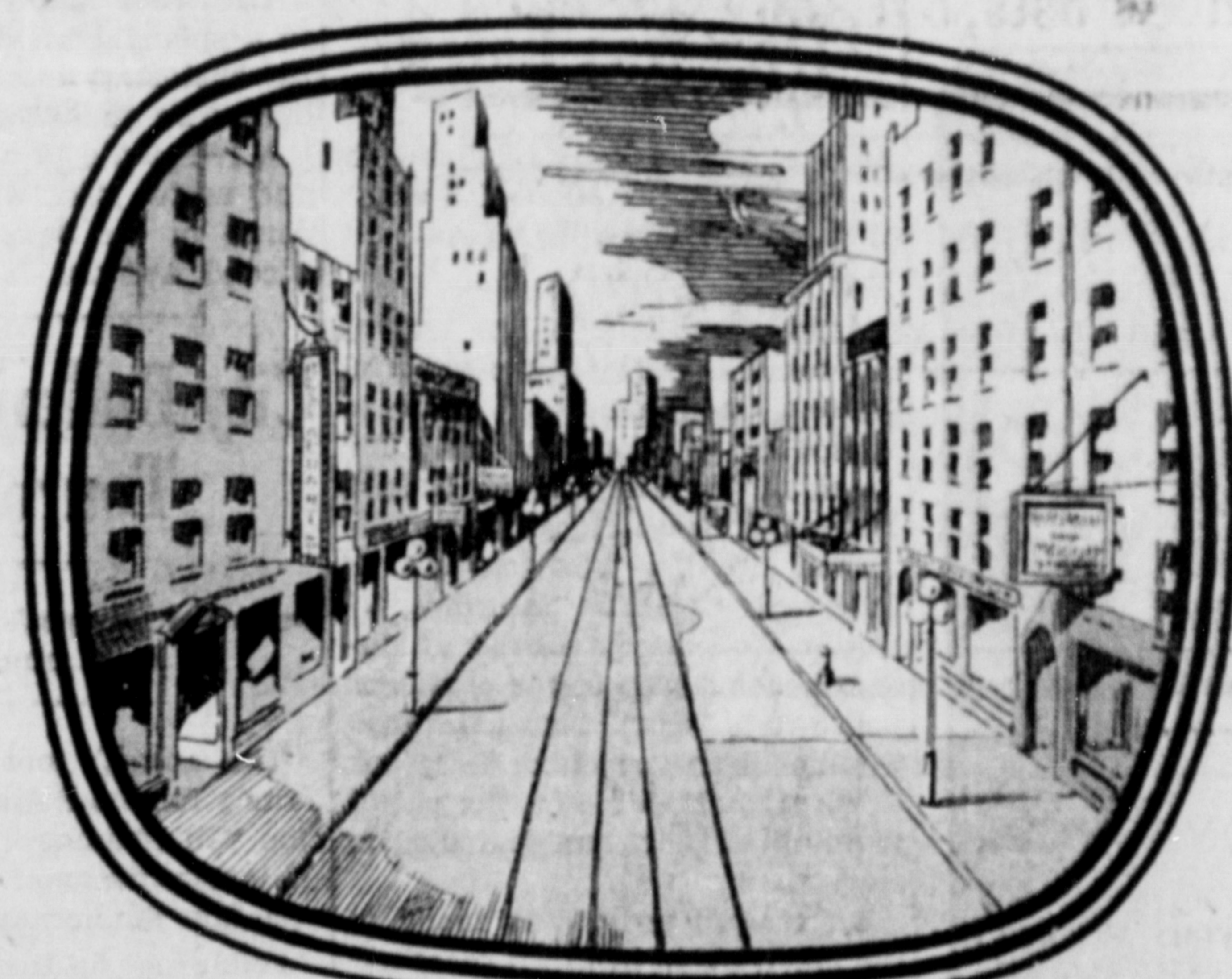
