## JAPANESE IN CONTROL

Crafic on Tientsin-Peiping Railway Halted-Britain Asks Explanation

### War Talk Rife

Tientsin Takes on Aspects of Armed Camp With Military Movements

LONDON, Nov 28: (CP)-In order to prevent the movement of Nationalist government troops from Central China to North China, where the autonomy movement is spreading, Japanese troops have halted all railway traffic between Tientsin and Peiping.

There being heavy British interests in the railways which have been seized by Japan, Great Britain today officially asked Japan in a note handed to the Japanese ambassador here, to indicate its exact intentions with regard to North China.
