They are Mr. and Mrs. Francis Rattenbury, and their son John, now six years old. Mr. Rattenbury was found seriously wounded of head injuries, in the living room of his home near London, March 24. He had been struck repeatedly by a heavy mallet. He died four days later. Police then arrested Mrs. Rattenbury, who is 31, and her 19-year-old chauffeur, George Stoner. They are accused of murdering the man. Mr. Rattenburg was a wealthy retired architect formerly of Vancouver. Mrs. Rattenbury and Stoner were formally committed for trial.
