She founded one movement, for world peace and was an active participant in nearly all others. Her study and work in sociology left an imprint in many lands.

Miss Addams was proud of her pacificism. "The militarists," she once said, "in the guise of patriotism have falsely portrayed pacificsm as fanaticism.
