VICTORIA DAY HOLIDAY

Tomorrow is Victoria Day and the Elks of the city have decided to take advantage of the general holiday to put on their annual flag day instead of on June 3. The main idea is to entertain the children and give them a lesson in patriotism. Sports and games will be a feature of the occasion.

There has been no time in history when lessons in patriotism were more needed than they are today. They are needed by those in high positions just as well as by the more lowly.

Patriotism is a desire to work for the good of the country rather than for the benefit of the individual. Its symbol in Canada is the Canadian ensign upon which the Union Jack is the most prominent feature. The patriotic desire should be to make this a country in which there shall be no poverty, no out of work group drawing relief, no grafters, but a country of intelligent, well-educated workers and voters.

The patriot is one who is not easily swayed by passing fads or by base appeals to passion. On the other hand he does not necessarily carry on as his forefathers did, if a better way can be found. In politics he is far above all parties although he may be a member of either if he considers it to be in the best interests of the country.

The true patriot is not hostile to other countries but is ready and anxious to work in harmony with every other nation to the end that the world may be improved and gradually brought to a realization that war is not only useless but ridiculous as well as horrible.

The Elks are to be congratulated on their efforts through the outward observance of patriotism to sow the seeds of a spiritual observance which would make Canada a real garden of Eden and her people among the happiest in the world.

BETTERING OF WORLD

CHICAGO, May 23. (AP).—The late Jane Addams, internationally known social worker and champion of world peace, who died in Passavant Hospital here following a relapse after an emergency abdominal operation, erected two fortresses of fame: her ideals of humaneness, an intangible stronghold of the spirit, and Hull-House, the tangible expression of that ideal.

The twain were born of a heart filled with a desire to "complete the mobilization of the human spirit" by bettering the life of the world, a desire which swept aside all barriers of race and religion.

In her search for practical means of forwarding this ambition, Hull-House was her laboratory. It became the source of social discoveries which sent rays of spiritual light into the darkest pits of civilization.

The Illinois hamlet of Cedarville, alone, knew of her birth on September 6, 1860. Before her life was much more than half completed the world was heeding the voice of an humanitarian whose passion for peace and justice became known from the tenements of Halsted Street to the tribunal of nations at Geneva.

Miss Addams was militant against what she called "the stupid atrocities of contemporary life, its arid waste, its meaningless labor, its needless suffering and its political corruption." Particularly was her influence felt in the fight for abolition of the scourge of war.

She founded one movement, for world peace and was an active participant in nearly all others. Her study and work in sociology left an imprint in many lands.

She shared the 1931 Nobel peace prize with Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia University.

Proud of Pacifism

Miss Addams was proud of her pacifism. "The militarists," she once said, "in the guise of patriotism have falsely portrayed pacifism as fanaticism. They profess Christianity; yet their armies slay and butcher. It is they who are fanatics, fanatical about power and greed and killing."

Her advocacy of peace reached its zenith in 1915 when she called the International Congress of Women at The Hague. An ending of the world war was its goal. In this the congress failed, but out of it grew the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom.

With Ellen Gates Starr, Miss Addams opened Hull-House on September 14, 1889, at Halsted and Polk Streets, in the midst of Chicago's squalid west side. Immigrants of two score and more nations, who had come to the capitol of the west to seek work and freedom, floundered in the Halsted Street neighborhood.

Enticing these people into Hull-

House was the hardest work for the young settlement workers. The racial tides surged strong, one against the others. But the hatreds were conquered and Hull-House today fills a city block. Six thousand men, women and children crowd into its activities each week.

Miss Addams was born of Quaker parents, John and Sarah Addams, John Addams was a banker-miller, an assemblyman and close friend of Abraham Lincoln.

The social worker suffered all her life from a childhood affliction, curvature of the spine. This deformity, she related, made her shrink from appearing in public with her father, less he be chagrined by having it known this "ugly duckling" was his.
