> In his report, Mr. Bradshaw made no recommendation for reduction of the interest rate on Vancouver's bonded debt. He claimed that the city's interest rate was comparable with many British and Canadian municipalities.

The Bradshaw report indicated that, although the situation presented some grave problems, they were by no means insurmountable. The chief fault was that Vancouver had not made the same effort as other Canadian municipalities to collect its revenues.

The report contained a tentative budget plan for the city with the recommendation that the provincial government contribute \$800.000, licence fees be inreased, a ten percent tax be imposed on rents, the school budget be reduced by \$250,000, water rates be increased and Sea Island airport, which cost the city almost \$600,000 and was being operated at a loss, be abandoned.
