#### GENERAL IMPROVEMENT

The budget laid before Parliament yesterday by Finance Minister Rhodes shows an all-round improvement in conditions. Expenditures increased over the previous year but income increased to a much larger extent, the total increase being thirty-eight million dollars. The railway deficit decreased by ten million and at the close of the fiscal year showed a loss of forty-eight million dollars. The national deficit of twenty-two million dollars of last year has been converted into a surplus of nearly three million, a most happy state of affairs were it not that the debt of the Dominion during the same time was increased by one hundred and seventeen million dollars. However, the condition is better, which is something to be thankful for.

#### GENERAL REFUNDING

Probably the most interesting feature of the budget speech is the announcement that a general refunding scheme is planned, one which may include the provincial and municipal debts. This is the feature of the budget which is particularly pleasing to Premier Pattullo, whose interview we publish today. If the whole debt of the country can be consolidated and refunded at a lower rate of interest, there will be a great saving to the country and the holders of securities will be in a much surer position than they are today. This is a very pleasing announcement and one that will be appreciated by a great many people.

#### VARIOUS CHANGES

There will be no objection in Prince Rupert to the proposal to place a surtax on all incomes over fourteen thousand dollars a year or on the gift tax on all presents from twenty-five thousand dollars up. Many dry souls in the city will also welcome the coming reduction of prices on liquor which will follow the reduction in the excise tax, a reduction which must be passed on to the consumer in order to become effective. Removal of the gold tax will also be well received in British Columbia, although there goes with it a change which will be almost as burdensome. The removal of the so-called excise tax on imports under the British preference is a step in the right direction and the general revision downward, if it really amounts to anything, will be welcomed as a means of increasing trade with other countries.

The budget is certainly an interesting one and we welcome most of the changes as being a movement in the right direction.
