Annual Report Of City is Out

Sixty-Three Percent of Taxes Collected—General Revenue Deficit Shown

The annual financial report of the Corporation of the City of Prince Rupert is just out of the hands of the printers and made its appearance yesterday. Affairs of the city are reviewed by City Commissioner W. J. Alder and the financial statement is presented by G. L. Rorie, city auditor. Most of the important information contained in the report has already been made public.

The report announces that the tax levy for the year 1934 was \$201,010.40 of which \$127,401.49, or 63.4%, was collected. Collection of tax arrears amounted to \$28,222.97 as against \$16,975.62 in 1933.

There was a general revenue deficit during the year of \$15,551.79.

WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Early Departure of Local Halibut Boats For Banks Expected—Herring Seining Continues—Halibut Liver Oil Being Produced Here

The general expectation along the waterfront appears to be that the coming week will see some of the local halibut boats away on their first trips of the season to the banks. While there had been no apparent break up to late this week in the decision to remain in port until such time as there was a definite improvement in the market outlook, there are now some factors which would appear to influence the local fleet to get out to the fishing with little further delay. One of these factors is the decision of the Vancouver vessel owners to start leaving for the banks today. Another factor is that the market is now believed to be nearing the position where it will be able to absorb a sizeable amount of fresh fish. Then there is also the matter of the Lenten market for fish and, if any advantage is to be reaped from that, it will be necessary that the boats should be making an early start. The whole situation will be gone into at a meeting of the Canadian Halibut Vessel Owners to be held tomorrow and it is believed likely that decision will be reached at that meeting on an early departure. It is hardly likely that the whole Canadian fleet would remain as a unit in still staying in port even should the American fleet, with their request for a large fund to assist in financing the freezing of fish and market stabilization now refused in Washington, decide to stay in until a minimum price is promised by the buyers which undertaking it is now generally agreed is almost impossible of securing. Meantime, however, no definite decision on the immediate course of action has yet been made by the local fleet although a show-down on the advisability of further delaying the start appears to be pending. Undoubtedly, the spirit of restiveness is becoming greater. Question of the distribution of proceeds of halibut livers, over which some disagreement has arisen between boat owners and fishermen, is also to be discussed tomorrow at the boat owners' meeting.

During the past week there have been some small deliveries of fresh halibut locally by Indians and white men not regular units of the fleet. From 6c to 10c has been paid for the fish all of which has been disposed of on the local fresh fish market.

C. P. B. Steamer Princess Louise, Capt. S. K. Gray, Arrived in Port at 5 o'clock Yesterday Afternoon from the South and Sailed at 10 p.m. on her Return to Vancouver and Waypoints.

Bound from San Francisco to the Aleutian Islands, a large amphibian flying boat, piloted by L. V. Blankman and with three men and one woman on board, put in here for about an hour early yesterday to refuel in the course of its northern flight. The ship, which made a non-stop flight from San Francisco to Vancouver, had made stops at Alert Bay and Butedale on the way here, having been forced down at Butedale on Thursday in a dense snowstorm and coming on here yesterday. Arriving here at 1:30 p.m., it was away again about an hour later with the intention of making Ketchikan and possibly farther by last evening. A Sikorsky monoplane, the machine is equipped with two 450 h.p. Pratt-Whitney engines. The party on board was in the Aleutians last year and plans on spending the coming season there. They will take moving pictures.

Having been delayed by extra freight business on her way up the coast, Union steamer Cardena, Capt. Ernest Georgeson, did not arrive in port until 6:30 this morning from the south, sailing at 8 a.m. on her return to Vancouver and waypoints.
