PASSING OF BABE

British Columbia Losing Business

ACCIDENTS IN AUTOS

Further Details of Fatality Near Burns Lake—Driver Held On Bail of \$15,000

Reports of recent automobile accidents on central interior roads, one of which near Burns Lake had a fatal result, having been referred to earlier in the week, have been received at divisional headquarters of the provincial police here.

The fatal crash was that on the main highway about three miles west of Burns Lake at 5 o'clock on Sunday morning when Frank Artriss, section hand at Endako, lost his life, the car, a light roadster, turning over and crushing him. Percy Wilkes of Decker Lake, the worker, was severely injured. The driver, Clifford Anderson, a Palling farmer, is being held on bail of \$15,000. The fatality is being investigated under the direction of Sergeant J. C. Bowen, provincial police, Smithers, and an inquest before Coroner (Dr.) W. C. Pitts of Fraser Lake was opened at Burns Lake, being adjourned to August 20.

When an automobile skidded on loose gravel on the Burns Lake-Francois Lake road and plunged into a fence, Peder Olsen sustained considerable head injuries and Arthur Henderson received a cut wrist while Mrs. Olsen and A. Lougheed escaped with a severe shaking up. Over \$100 damage was done to the car. Olsen appeared before Stipendiary Magistrate T. E. Taylor of Burns Lake on a charge of driving to the common danger and was fined \$10 and costs, with option of seven days' imprisonment, the fine being paid. The magistrate explained that he was passing a minimum sentence in view of the injuries which accused had received.

As a result of an accident on the new Smithers road, Walter S. Syrynyk of Smithers was fined \$10 and costs at Smithers by Stipendiary Magistrate R. L. Gale for driving to the common danger.

OVER 200 ARE DEAD IN ITALIAN FLOOD

TURIN, Italy, Aug. 14: (CP)—

A death list of 250 was estimated last night as a result of a disastrous flood following a sudden dam break yesterday in Northern Italy at the village of Ovada. Extensive damage was done to property and farms and many thousands were rendered homeless.

Forty-three square miles were inundated and railway and highway bridges were wiped out.

Hundreds of dwellings were destroyed.

Death at 11 o'clock this morning in the Prince Rupert General Hospital, after a final illness of two or three weeks, removed one of Prince Rupert's best known and most highly esteemed citizens in the person of Thomas Henry Ross MacKay, a pioneer of the British Columbia coast who came to Vancouver in 1895 and had lived in Prince Rupert for some fifteen years. While Mr. MacKay had been quite ill during the winter, he seemed to make a good recovery and for some time appeared to have been restored to almost normal health. About two or three weeks ago, he was taken to the Prince Rupert General Hospital where a major operation was performed. It was expected that he would have to have another operation but death intervened.

Born at Embro, Ont., sixty-five years ago, the late Mr. MacKay came to the coast forty years ago and for years operated a sash and door factory at Vancouver. He later moved to Ocean Falls, being there during mill construction days, and then came to Prince Rupert about 1920. He took a keen interest in all public matters and had been identified with various local movements. He was engaged in the glass and door business and established a small shingle mill at Cow Bay.

In addition to his widow, Mr. MacKay is survived by a daughter, Mrs. D. R. (Jean) Barclay, and two grandchildren, David and Peggy Barclay. There are also two sisters, Mrs. Thomas Stewart and Mrs. Marshall Gainer of Calgary, and five brothers, Rev. George MacKay of Toledo, Ohio, and John, Angus, Roderick and Robert MacKay of Calgary. The bereaved will have the deep sympathy of many friends.

Funeral arrangements are in the hands of the B. C. Undertakers.

During the height of the fire Robert Garner, "iron chink" man, dropped dead. He was an ex-service man and was known to have had heart trouble. It is believed that he was overcome by the fire.

He was 42 years of age, married and had lived on the Skeena River for years. The remains were brought to the city yesterday afternoon aboard the provincial passenger boat P.M.L. 8.

After leaving here yesterday afternoon for the south the steamer Catala called at Oceanic to pick up 600 cases of canned salmon for Vancouver.
