POPULATION AND EDUCATION.

The population of the city is increasing and the education facilities of the city are being taxed to the limit in providing for all the youngsters that are offering. Class rooms are bulging and teachers are already working hard. If the increase continues we shall be feeling growing pains and we hope we shall have the opportunity. Nothing would please us better than to be a little crowded.

A year ago people were suggesting that our population had decreased since the census when the official count was six thousand three hundred and twenty-six odd. Now they, are suggesting that the population is considerably higher than that. The recent demand for small houses was probably caused by the arrival here of families from Anyox who are awaiting the starting of the pulp mill. These people think they see more opportunity here than in the south where competition is keener and life more complicated.

We are glad to know that the local schools are able to take care of all the pupils that are offering and that in cases where there is too much pressure, extra teachers are being provided.

One of the signs of the times in this part of the country is the fact that all the qualified girls who last year were unable to secure schools are now teaching, either in the WALLACE city or country. In fact there is not a qualified unmarried teacher in a position to do sustituting and married teachers have to be impressed into the service.
