Staff Qualifications

The personell of the scientific staffs of the stations were published in the annual report and study of the university qualifications and specialized training in scientific research of the members! would reveal their right to a status equal to that of the professorial staff of a university. In consequence the salaries of these men were scheduled and graded on a somewhat similar basis. Dr. Carter briefly outlined the present salary schedule and to give some idea of the salary scale stated that his own salary as director was \$3618 per annum. The staff is not under the civil service.

When one considered that to obtain the necessary university degrees in science six or seven years study with specialization at a university was required, and to obtain the doctor's degree at least two additional years were required, one could perceive that a man of 26 or 27 years of age with such training should receive a salary high enough to give him some compensation for the years spent in training.
