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# VANCOUVER HAS SERIOUS RIOTING

## MRS. RATTENBURY AND HER CHAUFFEUR TO BE COMMITTED

### Big Department Store Scene Of One Clash With Another At Busy Downtown Corner At Night

#### Reads Riot Act

Riot Act Read by Mayor McGeer Who Declared That Communist Organization is Endeavoring to Precipitate General Strike in Southern City

VANCOUVER, April 24: (CP)—Two thousand unemployed parading against traffic regulations along Granville Street yesterday afternoon entered the Hudson Bay Co.'s department store and, when police tried to eject them, broke glass in forty showcases and hurled goods about the store. They then paraded to Victory Square on Hastings Street where they maintained comparative order but did not disperse until Mayor G. G. McGeer read the Riot Act to them. When the mayor granted their request that they be allowed to parade away they did so behind mounted city constables. About 250 city, provincial and Royal Canadian Mounted Police constables surrounded the Square.

Near midnight, after the police had raided two of the unemployed headquarters, a crowd of about two thousand gathered at Carrall and Hastings Street and were dispersed by the police only after a series of battles. A few windows were broken. Six police officers and a number of strikers were injured, none seriously. Seventeen arrests were made.

Mayor McGeer declared that "there is a definite organization of communistic activities centering in calling a general strike in Vancouver." He forbade further parades or disturbances.

The camp strikers, cut off relief, have run out of money raised by the recent tag day and other subscriptions with which to eat.

### Formal Murder Charges Are Now Laid Following Recent Mallet Slaying

Pair Plead Not Guilty and Reserve Defence—Preliminary Trial Reserved For Week When Decision Will be Reconsidered

BOURNEMOUTH, England, April 24: (CP)—At the conclusion of the preliminary hearing today, formal charges of murder were laid against Mrs. Alma Rattenbury and her nineteen-year old chauffeur, George Percy Stoner, in connection with the death of the woman's husband, Francis M. Rattenbury, former British Columbia architect and land speculator. Both accused pleaded not guilty and reserved their defence. They were remanded for one week when they will be committed for trial.

### CARDINALS TAKE LEAD

World Champions Defeat Chicago Cubs—Red Sox Still on Top In American

ST. LOUIS, April 24: (CP)—Behind the pitching of Paul Dean, the world champion, St. Louis Cardinals, defeating Chicago Cubs in a free-hitting game yesterday, moved into the leadership of the National League while the New York Giants, by virtue of a close victory over Boston Braves at the Polo Grounds, assumed second place. The Brooklyn Dodgers and Cincinnati Reds, losing to the Phillies and Pittsburgh Pirates respectively, dropped into third place, still in a tie.

Tom Yawkey's Boston Red Sox continued their winning streak by defeating the New York Yankees and remained in first place in the American League. It was the first home stand of the Red Sox this year before 20,000 fans and their fourth straight win. The Cleveland Indians continued in second place as a result of a close victory over St. Louis Browns.

### SITUATION UNCHANGED

No Further Developments in Connection With Dispute Over Halibut Livers

With either side waiting for the other to make a move, there is no change today in the situation as affects the dispute between the halibut boat owners and union fishermen over the sharing of proceeds of halibut livers.

The Deep Sea Fishermen's Union held its regular weekly meeting last night and discussed the situation, deciding to adjourn to a special meeting to be held Friday night.

An official statement was made today on behalf of the Canadian Halibut Vessel Owners' Association announcing that Capt. George Fritz, president of the association, had intimated to the fishermen that their (the fishermen's) proposal for arbitration would probably be agreed to by the boat owners providing the fishermen give thirty-day notice of intention to terminate the existing fishing contract and go fishing pending arbitration on the basis of the boats receiving one-fifth share of halibut livers in gross stock. To this proposal, the boat owners state, no reply has been given by the fishermen.

If arbitration should not uphold the one-fifth boat share, it is pointed out by the boat owners that such new arrangement as might be reached would be retroactive.

The boat owners are being canvassed, it is said, as they arrive in port on their willingness to arbitrate. Some of the owners, it is admitted, have expressed unwillingness to arbitrate and are insisting upon the one-fifth boat share or nothing.

Meantime, the most of the boats of the fleet are being manned by the owners with the large majority of the union fishermen remaining idle in port.

### FIGURES IN CAR SMASH

Mrs. Amy Johnson Mollison Mixed Up in Fatal Auto Accident In England

BARNSTON, Yorkshire, Eng., April 24: (CP)—An automobile driven by Army Johnson Mollison was involved on Good Friday in a highway accident in which one man was killed and another seriously injured.

The men were riding a motorcycle when the car in front of that of Mrs. Mollison sideswiped their machine and threw them off into the path of the flier's car, giving her no chance to avoid hitting them.

### GIANT SEAPLANE FINISHES FLIGHT SAFELY TUESDAY

ALAMEDA, Cal., April 24: (CP)—Completing the first round trip flight to Hawaii, the giant four-motored Sikorsky flying boat Pan American Clipper, with a load of air mail and her crew of six, landed here at 2:58 yesterday afternoon, having made the return flight in twenty hours and forty minutes. The machine's speed was held down to ninety miles per hour owing to headwinds but the flight was uneventful.
