# WHIFFLETS

From the Waterfront

Boat Owners Prepared to Leave For Halibut Banks—Daly Off to Vancouver With Party on Board — Capt. Dickson Returning to Command.

There were no further developments up to this morning in regard to the forthcoming commencement of the season's halibut fishing operations. The boat owners have deferred the completion of their arrangements for the taking out of the boats pending a meeting tonight of the fishermen's union when the question of sharing of proceeds of halibut livers will be the principal matter of discussion and also pending receipt of word which is expected from Seattle tomorrow on the matter of further negotiations of the United States fleet with the fish buyers in regard to a possible minimum price arrangement.

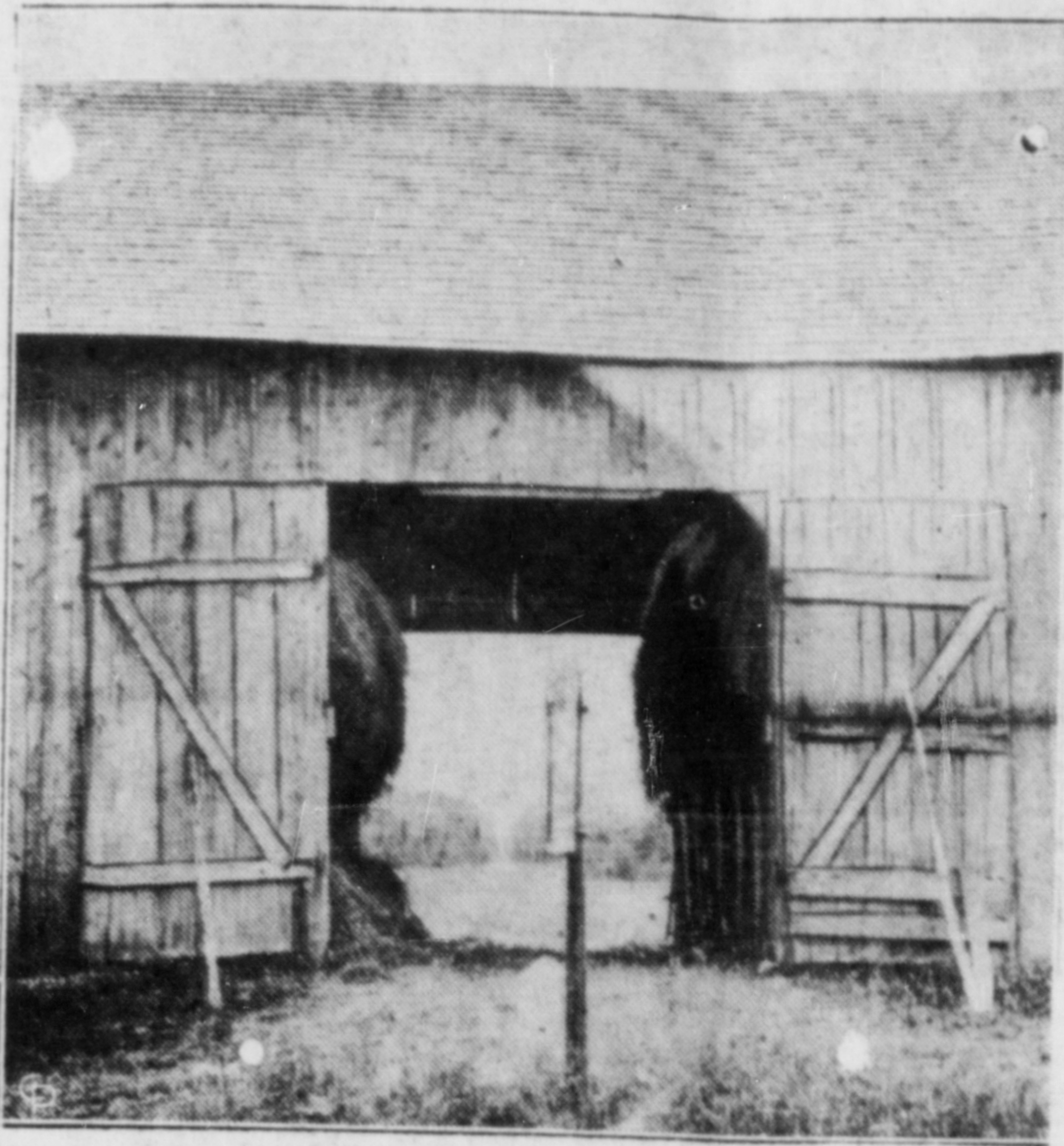
Armour Salvage Co.'s power tug Daly, having in tow the houseboat of Mr. and Mrs. W. G. Bremner, which is to be taken to Vancouver Island where Mr. Bremner will engage in salmon buying, left for the south at 8 o'clock last evening. Mr. and Mrs. Bremner had been in residence here during the past winter aboard the houseboat. Making the trip aboard the Daly are Capt. and Mrs. W. P. Armour, Mr. and Mrs. W. O. Fulton, Mrs. Max Asemissen and Miss June Armour. They expect to be away about ten days or two weeks and Vancouver will be visited.

Northland Transportation Co.'s motorship Norco, Capt. Elkholm, arrived in port at 8:30 this morning from Ketchikan and, after discharging one carload of frozen fish for transshipment East over Canadian National Railways, sailed a couple of hours later for Seattle. J. R. McWilliams, well known coast wireless operator, has now joined the steamer Princess Norah on the Alaska route. Until a couple of months ago aboard the steamer Catala, he has since been on the Princess Charlotte and Princess Alice on the Triangle Run.

Capt. T. Quinn, Seattle pilot, who came north recently with the tanker William D. Lucas, which has been tied up at Ketchikan owing to the seamen's strike, was a passenger aboard the Princess Norah yesterday afternoon going south. With her crew having gone ashore on strike, the tanker is now lying at Ketchikan with only her skipper and chief engineer aboard.

Union steamer Catala, Capt. James Findlay, returned to port at 9:45 this morning from Anyox, Stewart and other northern points and sailed at 1:30 this afternoon for Vancouver and waypoints. Capt. A. E. Dickson, regular master of the

Catala, who has been ashore in Vancouver for the past few months, is expected to be back in command of the vessel on her next voyage, arriving here next Sunday from the south.

There were thirty-three passengers aboard the steamer Princess Norah which was in port yesterday afternoon southbound from Skagway to Vancouver. One passenger—N. L. Freeman—disembarked from the vessel here while one—G. A. Yardley—went south aboard her.

Corp. J. McNaught, assistant mechanical supervisor of the provincial police, who arrived in the city Sunday evening on the Catala from Victoria, is here to supervise engine overhaul of the local police boat P. M. L. 8 which is at present in progress.

From time to time recently there have been reports of the plan of the Canadian National Railways to fill in Cow Bay. As far as can be learned in official quarters, there is no intention whatever of undertaking such a project.

C. N. R. steamer Prince John, Capt. Neil McLean, coming north to Prince Rupert from Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands, arrived in Massett Inlet at 3 o'clock this afternoon from Skidegate Inlet and is expected to arrive here tomorrow morning.

A. Crozier, who has been relieving as Canadian customs officer at Stewart, was a passenger aboard the Catala today returning to Victoria.

# CHURCHMAN IS COMING

Archbishop of Toronto and Primate Of All Canada Due Tomorrow

Prince Rupert is to be honored this week by a visit from Most Reverend D. T. Owen, D.D., Archbishop of Toronto and Primate of all Canada, accompanied by C. L. Foster, a prominent Church of England layman, who is taking the place of Sir Henry Drayton, who was called to England a short time before his planned visit.

The visitors will arrive from Vancouver tomorrow morning. In the evening they will meet the members of the St. Andrew's Cathedral congregation at a dinner in the Cathedral Hall. Thursday Dr. Owen will address the Rotary Club and Thursday evening the visitors will be guests at dinner of Bishop and Mrs. Rix at their home on Fourth Avenue, other guests being the clergy and their wives, fourteen in all. Rev. Oliver Thorne of Kincolith and Rev. Capt. William Delap of the Northern Cross are in the city to meet the Primate.

# Anglo-American Understanding

Subject of Charles Ellison in Addressing British-Israel Society Last Night

Charles Ellison, whose subject was "Anglo-American Understanding," was the speaker last night at the regular fortnightly meeting of the local British-Israel Society. He described how democracy started in Great Britain, discussing its peculiarities and showing that Great Britain and United States were the only two great nations that were practising true democracy and had the attributes of tolerance from which would emerge the Theocratic state.

P. H. Linzey, president of the Society, was in the chair and Mr. Ellison's discourse was followed by a general discussion in which Robert Bartlett, W. H. Wilson-Murray, Dr. W. C. Aspinall, Samuel Massey, George Wilson, Robert Gordon and J. D. Allen took part.

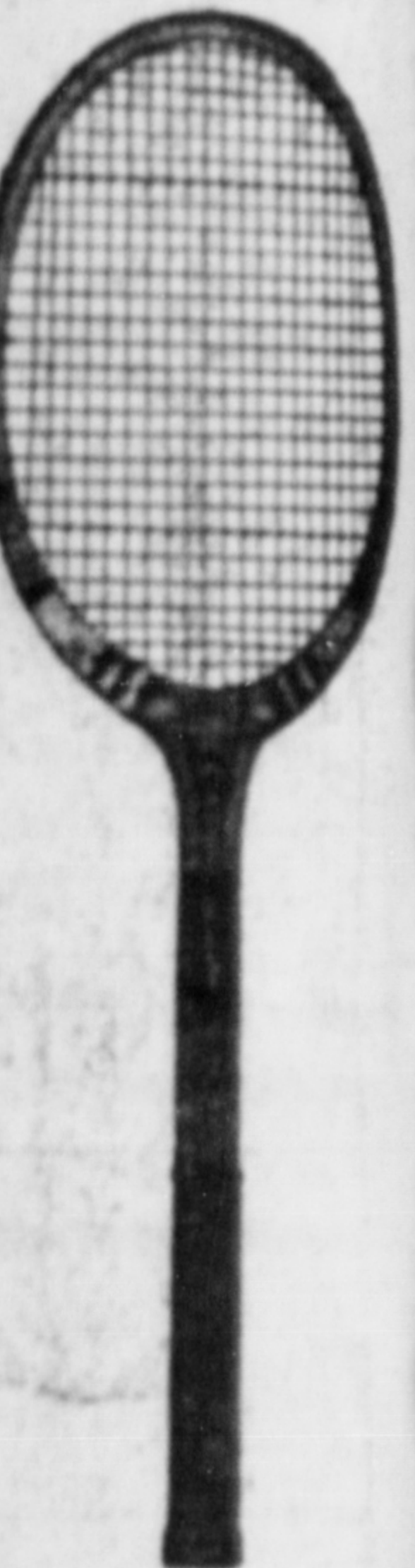
