Codos and Rossi Leave France With Plan For Making Buenos Aires

Hope is to Cover 6700 Miles in Less Than Seventy Hours For New Long Distance Record—Sighted Passing Over Tangiers

ISTRES, France, Feb. 16: (CP)-Paul Codos and Maurice Rossi hopped off at 6:30 this morning on a projected flight across the Southern Atlantic Ocean to Buenos Aires in the attempt to better their present world's non-stop distance record by more than a thousand miles. It is their ambition to span the 6700 miles in less than seventy hours.
